1                   MAYOR WILDER: Good morning. This is Mayor  
2 Steve Wilder from the City of North Canton calling to  
3 order the North Canton Board of Control meeting for  
4 February the 18th, 2021, at 11:32 a.m.

5                   Roll call. Mayor Wilder is present.

6                   Patrick DeOrio.

7                   MR. DEORIO: Here.

8                   MAYOR WILDER: Jina Alaback.

9                   MS. ALABACK: Here.

10                  MAYOR WILDER: Wayne Boyer.

11                  MR. BOYER: Here.

12                  MAYOR WILDER: And assisting us today is City  
13 Engineer Rob Graham.

14                  Item No. 3 is the approval of minutes from  
15 January 5, 2021. May I have a motion to accept.

16                  MR. DEORIO: So moved.

17                  MAYOR WILDER: So moved, DeOrio.

18                  MS. ALABACK: Second.

19                  MAYOR WILDER: Second by Alaback. Any  
20 discussion on the minutes from January 5, 2021? If  
21 not, I will just call for a voice vote for approval.  
22 All in favor, say "aye."

23                  ("Aye" in unison.)

24                  MAYOR WILDER: Those opposed, nay. The ayes  
25 have it. Minutes are accepted.

1           Item No. 4 before the board for new business,  
2           we're here to talk about the 2021 street maintenance  
3           paving program which council approved on December 4,  
4           2020, under Ordinance No. 78-2020. I will now -- I  
5           will now open the floor to Engineer Graham to discuss  
6           our options and who he feels is our lowest and best  
7           bidder.

8           Mr. Graham.

9           MR. GRAHAM: Thank you, Mr. Mayor.

10           In the ordinance we allocated, or council  
11           allocated again this year \$350,000, so we put the  
12           project out to bid. We opened bids on January 13,  
13           2021. We had five bidders submit bids and we had a  
14           very competitive bid opening. Very close. Our low  
15           bid was submitted by Central-Allied Enterprises,  
16           Inc., in the amount of \$261,601 for the base bid and  
17           then the alternate to adjust the manholes via the  
18           Mr. Manhole method was \$16,500. That gave us quite a  
19           bit under our allocation, and the specifications  
20           allows us to add or deduct, as need be, streets to  
21           match the funding. What I'm proposing to do is add  
22           two more streets. The map is in your packet. Be  
23           Cheswold Circle and Fenchurch Circle, both in the  
24           Washington Square subdivision if you want to add the  
25           streets in. You don't want the contractor driving

1 all over town.

2 MAYOR WILDER: Exactly.

3 MR. GRAHAM: But additional work where  
4 they're working, that would cost the price up to,  
5 again I have this noted in your packet, 310,635.50.  
6 Talked to the contractor and he is fine with that.  
7 He just had one item that I failed to neglect. For  
8 the maintenance of traffic he would like to have an  
9 additional \$4,000 over his price base because he has  
10 to have folks out there controlling all that truck  
11 traffic for a couple days off Market Avenue in and  
12 out of the subdivision. And that's a fair request,  
13 and any of our five bidders would have certainly made  
14 that fair request. So with that, if we take the  
15 complete tab there for 16,500 and another 4,000,  
16 Engineering would recommend to the Board of Control  
17 that we go ahead and add the two streets to the bid  
18 documents to the contract and award a contract to  
19 Central-Allied Enterprises, Inc., in the amount of  
20 \$331,135.50 to complete our 2021 street maintenance  
21 and paving program. And also in your packet is the  
22 certified certificate on the unresolved findings,  
23 which there were none.

24 MAYOR WILDER: Would you repeat the number  
25 again. 331 --

1 MR. GRAHAM: Sure. \$331,135.50.

2 MR. DEORIO: Mr. Graham, what was budgeted  
3 for this when you sent it out to bid?

4 MR. GRAHAM: When we sent it out to bid, we  
5 were within our allocation, but I thought the base  
6 bid would come in somewhere around 300. 310. And --

7 MR. DEORIO: What did council authorize? How  
8 much is it?

9 MR. GRAHAM: A total of 350.

10 MR. DEORIO: Okay.

11 MR. GRAHAM: I would like to add a couple of  
12 streets rather than delete them.

13 MR. DEORIO: And prior to making any  
14 adjustments, your conclusion is that Central-Allied  
15 Enterprises, Inc., has the lowest bid at 261,601 and  
16 that the next closest bid was from Superior Paving at  
17 269,840.55; is that correct?

18 MR. GRAHAM: On the base bid, yes.

19 MR. DEORIO: Yes. On the base bid. When you  
20 then factor in the alternate, the alternate bid for  
21 Central-Allied is 16,500, which also is the lowest  
22 bid.

23 MR. GRAHAM: Uh-huh.

24 MR. DEORIO: The next lowest is from a  
25 different vendor, Northstar Asphalt.

1 MR. GRAHAM: Uh-huh.

2 MR. DEORIO: But their base bid was higher  
3 than Superior's. So by all measures, is it your  
4 belief that on the base bid and the alternate bid  
5 that the lowest bid is from Central-Allied?

6 MR. GRAHAM: I would agree with that, yes.

7 MR. DEORIO: Okay. Now, have we used  
8 Central-Allied before?

9 MR. GRAHAM: Yes. They just recently had the  
10 substantial completion for our East Maple Street  
11 enhancement project and they did, three years ago  
12 when I first came here, they did a federal paving on  
13 South Main Street. And then we had some issue with  
14 them on a water line job so they were not deemed the  
15 lowest and best bid on our Applegrove project about a  
16 year and a half ago, but they have since recovered,  
17 if that's a good word, from that mistake.

18 MR. DEORIO: What was our experience with  
19 them on the East Maple project?

20 MR. GRAHAM: They did a great job. Again, it  
21 was different crews, it was more cement and  
22 electrical crews on East Maple, but they did a really  
23 nice job based on the information I've got.

24 MR. DEORIO: Who won our general paving  
25 program last year?

1 MR. GRAHAM: Last two years was Superior  
2 Paving.

3 MR. DEORIO: Is one of the advantages that  
4 Central-Allied has right now is that they have other  
5 crews in the area doing other work?

6 MR. GRAHAM: I suspect that's the case. I  
7 know they were -- have been awarded by the Stark  
8 County Commissioners Applegrove resurfacing this  
9 spring from Marquardt to Market. So they do have  
10 crews in the area. And I also understand they're  
11 doing a water line extension for the City of Canton,  
12 starts at the corp line at 50th Street and Cleveland  
13 Avenue and go south into the city of Canton. So they  
14 do have crews in the area.

15 MR. DEORIO: In making adjustments because  
16 the bid came in below your expectation and what  
17 council had authorized, adding in the rest of  
18 Cheswold Circle, Northeast, and Fenchurch Circle,  
19 Northeast, you've gone in and made adjustments to the  
20 spreadsheet?

21 MR. GRAHAM: Right. The second spreadsheet  
22 that's in your packet today has highlighted the three  
23 quantities that have changed that brought that  
24 Central's base to 310,635 and then Superior and  
25 Northstar are each in the 326 neighborhood, so that



1 makes an \$8,000 spread.

2 MR. DEORIO: So based on your calculations,  
3 even with the addition of these two streets  
4 Central-Allied comes in at the lowest.

5 MR. GRAHAM: Absolutely. Yes. It actually  
6 takes that \$8,000, which is so close on 300,000, and  
7 makes the gap 16, and plus a couple, few more on the  
8 alternate.

9 MR. DEORIO: So I guess one of the concerns  
10 that I have is that the record of performance with  
11 Central-Allied on some of the jobs in the city have  
12 been inconsistent. And I would say that if it's this  
13 board's decision that Central-Allied represents the  
14 lowest -- the lowest and best bid, they certainly  
15 represent the lowest bid, but usually on the best  
16 part of it it's when you're going with someone higher  
17 than the lowest now you're looking at quality. So  
18 what I would be saying to you is that I will be  
19 watching this contract closely this year to make sure  
20 that the quality of the work being performed is to  
21 the satisfaction of yourself, myself, and the mayor  
22 and the council, because in the difference in the  
23 price, you know, we have had much more experience  
24 with Superior and it's been much more consistent with  
25 satisfaction.

1 MR. GRAHAM: We're agreed with that. We  
2 watch on every job, but yes, with Central-Allied  
3 their paving always has been consistent, at least  
4 while I have been here.

5 MAYOR WILDER: Any other discussion?  
6 Questions or points of interest?

7 MR. BOYER: Yeah, I have one question.

8 MAYOR WILDER: Go ahead, Mr. Boyer.

9 MR. BOYER: If I may. In looking at the --  
10 looking at the bids themselves, I noticed that  
11 basically they were recent -- and this is to  
12 piggyback off of Mr. DeOrion's point. The reason  
13 Central-Allied's bid appears to be lower across the  
14 board has to do with the third item on each of the  
15 bids. They appear to be bidding that unit price at  
16 approximately half of what virtually everybody else  
17 is. And my question for you is basically, A, what  
18 exactly is that unit; and B, can you explain why  
19 perhaps there would be that discrepancy between their  
20 bid amount at 1.30 per unit and everybody else's  
21 which is in a general range of 2 1/2 to \$3 per unit.

22 MR. GRAHAM: Yeah. Absolutely. What the  
23 item is, it's in the Washington Square subdivision  
24 and we've got a lot of cracking failure of the  
25 pavement out there. So what we decided to do, I

1 brought three different experts in last summer to  
2 take a look at it and they recommended a little bit  
3 deeper of a mill to take out an inch and  
4 three-quarters, then put this fabric down on just the  
5 Washington Square streets. And the pavement is also  
6 low out there, so we'll replace that with 2 inches of  
7 new pavement. And you're exactly right. Very  
8 observant. That's literally how they won the job  
9 because it was so close based on the base bid, that  
10 dollar-thirty per square yard item.

11 And in my discussions -- and we did some  
12 mathematics to see who would be the lowest and best  
13 bidder when we added a couple more streets, and  
14 that's why we chose the streets in Washington Square,  
15 because of that low fabric price. So called the  
16 contractor back and said This is what we're looking  
17 at doing, and the first thing I said was, I'll tell  
18 you one job, and he kind of balked, I'm going to lose  
19 money there, but his asphalt number is a bit higher,  
20 if you notice. It's like \$5 or \$3, depending which  
21 contractor you're looking at, a yard higher, and his  
22 milling is a lot less. I mean, he said basically  
23 because he has crews on Applegrove and, yeah, he bid  
24 it to sell more asphalt so it's more advantageous to  
25 us to bump up that fabric quantity. And he realizes

1 that the bid documents give us that ability. So we  
2 thought we'd take advantage of it. But I wouldn't  
3 call it to the point where it's an unbalanced bid.  
4 So he chose to bid that at a slight loss. Because I  
5 already said we will not be -- the facts were clear,  
6 we went with that Petro -- Petromat/Enviro fabric,  
7 that's something different, and we'll be looking at  
8 that and make sure we get the product, that exact  
9 fabric.

10 MR. DEORIO: Let me throw this out to you  
11 then. Let's say that, you know, this was starting to  
12 develop this project and a different fabric was going  
13 to be used. Your team is out there inspecting it and  
14 they can readily identify the different fabric.

15 MR. GRAHAM: Uh-huh.

16 MR. DEORIO: And they say "Stop." Then what  
17 happens?

18 MR. GRAHAM: We would issue them a stop, tell  
19 them to stop, put it in writing that this doesn't  
20 meet the contract specifications. And you really  
21 can't lay in front of the equipment. They can put  
22 down whatever, and that doesn't mean we'll pay for  
23 it. And then it becomes more of a legal matter; it  
24 didn't match the specs, didn't match the shop  
25 drawings that you had given us; you chose to do

1 something different outside the contract documents,  
2 so it becomes a legal matter.

3 MR. DEORIO: So then, Mr. Boyer, what would  
4 you say to that if that scenario rolled out that way?

5 MR. BOYER: I mean, that is a concern that I  
6 would have. Just obviously, you know, if we're  
7 trying to save money on the front end, let's say, but  
8 we're going to have to factor in 15-, \$20,000 of  
9 legal expenses on the back end then obviously the  
10 math doesn't completely work out. So that was just  
11 generally my concern. I understand what Mr. Graham's  
12 explanation of things and it makes sense to me from a  
13 perspective, but it's certainly something we have to  
14 keep in mind.

15 MAYOR WILDER: Well, with your experience  
16 over time you're confident to go forward with your  
17 proposal?

18 MR. GRAHAM: I'm confident in my  
19 recommendation. Again, I've spoken with the CEO of  
20 Central-Allied and brought that right to his  
21 attention because he knew what he did. And so we  
22 took advantage of that number and added two streets  
23 where we needed that. And he was on board with it.  
24 He kind of admitted, well, we were shrewd also to  
25 test that and he was fine with it. The only thing he

1 asked for was the additional \$4,000 for the  
2 maintenance of traffic, which is a fair request.  
3 You've got two more days of work to get numerous  
4 trucks off of Market Avenue so --

5 MAYOR WILDER: Well, safety is a priority.  
6 That's going to have a price with it, and we don't  
7 want it to be the price of a life.

8 MR. GRAHAM: Right. And, you know, I point  
9 out to him the asphalt cost was more than the two  
10 competitors.

11 MAYOR WILDER: Okay.

12 MR. DEORIO: What if one of those other --  
13 what if the next one would have said, well, I  
14 wouldn't add anything for it extra; I wouldn't charge  
15 you anything, ask any reimbursement for extra  
16 security.

17 MR. GRAHAM: Right. Well, you look at the  
18 graph then. We've got 310 and actually 314, Superior  
19 and Northstar is still at 326 and 325 with higher  
20 costs with Mr. Manhole. So they're still, even at  
21 zero, they're still not close to being the lowest.

22 In my discussions, I said, well, we'll  
23 prorate your 5,000, 14,500 based on the additional  
24 square yardage area that we added, and I believe  
25 Central-Allied said, well, it's not quite a direct

1 ratio like that because this work is all mostly from  
2 Market Avenue. And that's where we added the extra  
3 work.

4 MR. DEORIO: Well, I've seen contracts, bids,  
5 that the city has gone down a path before where  
6 someone, you know, put in a really low number on some  
7 things to buy the business and then, as the project  
8 unfolded, certain contingencies started to occur  
9 which started to drive the cost up and outside the  
10 parameters of the agreement and we ended up in  
11 litigation over it and, you know, ended up, you know,  
12 putting a lot more in it, you know, than what we  
13 saved by declaring that it was the best bid. So I'm  
14 just -- I'm really -- you know, I certainly, you  
15 know, if the motion is to say that this is the lowest  
16 and best bid I couldn't support that because it's, in  
17 my mind, I see red flags on it, but if the motion is  
18 it's the lowest bid then I would obviously have to  
19 agree that it is the lowest bid.

20 Mr. Boyer, what does the motion have to be?

21 MR. BOYER: I think ultimately the motion has  
22 to be that it's got to be the lowest and best bid. I  
23 think we have to factor in all of those, you know,  
24 reservations and everything. I certainly don't think  
25 that we have to do it to the bare bones, you know,

1 base it on the lowest price. I think we have to say,  
2 hey, this is the lowest and best bid, factoring in  
3 all our contingencies, factoring in all of our  
4 concerns. And so if the lowest and best bid for the  
5 city happens to be the bid that is not the lowest  
6 price point but is the best because of previous  
7 interactions, because of comfort with the quality of  
8 the work, then so be it. You know, price is not the  
9 exclusive consideration here. It's a major  
10 consideration, but it is not the exclusive  
11 consideration.

12 MS. ALABACK: Rob, where would the next  
13 bidder be on the base and the alternate with or  
14 without adding the two streets, do we know?

15 MR. GRAHAM: With adding -- without adding  
16 the two streets, the base bid was -- second and third  
17 place literally was \$27 out of 270,000. Amazing. So  
18 we have -- we need to recommend awarding the  
19 alternate because we'll have some manholes that need  
20 adjusted. So that would put the lowest and best by  
21 just a smidge, you're talking a thousand dollars, to  
22 Northstar Asphalt.

23 MS. ALABACK: And is that still under the 350  
24 budget?

25 MR. GRAHAM: That would still be under the



1 350 budget. We add the two additions, 326, 325 and  
2 20, we're around 345, 346,000. We'll still -- if  
3 they wanted a little extra for maintenance of traffic  
4 we would be right there. And both firms could put  
5 out an award. Superior, we're quite comfortable with  
6 their crews. They literally, in the last two years,  
7 have done seven jobs with us. We're comfortable with  
8 any of them. It's our job to make sure they follow  
9 the plans and specs. We would likely have an easier  
10 time making sure that happens with Superior and/or  
11 Northstar. We're very, very comfortable with  
12 Superior. But --

13 MR. DEORIO: When is the last time Northstar  
14 did work for us?

15 MR. GRAHAM: Northstar slash sister company  
16 Wenger Excavating did the work on Northfield last  
17 year and they did some extra paving on Knoll and they  
18 did that for us. And they did the great job.

19 MR. DEORIO: Who did the West Maple Street?

20 MR. GRAHAM: West Maple Street, that was for  
21 the reconstruction and turn lane addition three years  
22 ago. That was Central-Allied. And they were quite  
23 busy at the time and, in my mind, we had a closure  
24 that lasted a lot longer than it should have for that  
25 block. And we had some issues with Central-Allied on

1 the Everhard water line extension a number of years  
2 ago, which then cost them being the lowest and best  
3 bidder on our Applegrove paving last year. Then they  
4 were successful being lowest and best on the East  
5 Maple, which was not a paving job, and they look at  
6 it as a comparison to like a hockey game in a penalty  
7 box. Put them in the penalty box for two minutes,  
8 they lost Applegrove. They came out of the box and  
9 did a very nice job for us, but still, we'll have to  
10 watch them. We're prepared to watch closely knowing  
11 right out of the get-go what are we going to get for  
12 the fabric.

13 MR. DEORIO: Well, in my opinion, I'm  
14 prepared to support a bid to Northstar Asphalt as the  
15 lowest and best. In my opinion, that they have, in  
16 the bid documents that have been submitted that we  
17 are looking at a cost for a particular component,  
18 Petromat/Enviro paving fabric is stipulated in the  
19 bid document plan. We've had one, two, three, four,  
20 five bidders on this. Four of the five bidders are  
21 indicating prices in the range of 2.50 a unit bid up  
22 to \$3 a unit bid, with the exception of  
23 Central-Allied, which is at a 1.30 unit bid. I don't  
24 believe that that's a number that is one in which  
25 they are adequately pricing and that I believe it is

1 an important component to this project and I'm going  
2 to say it's probably the most important component to  
3 this project, that that be done right and per the bid  
4 specs. The city has had experience with improper  
5 paving fabric or improper paving over the fabric in  
6 years past. It's turned out to be expensive. Not  
7 saying that that involved Central-Allied, I don't  
8 know the contractor for that in my recollection, but  
9 I understand the experience that goes with it. I do  
10 know that we've had a more consistent record with  
11 performance as it relates to two of the other  
12 bidders, Northstar and Superior, and, you know,  
13 having those problems that's raised I look at the  
14 Northstar bid to be the one that I would say, as just  
15 one member of this board, is the lowest and best bid.

16 MAYOR WILDER: The recommendation is to go  
17 with Northstar for the lowest and best bid?

18 MR. DEORIO: That hasn't been made in the  
19 form of a motion. I'm just sharing my opinion to see  
20 what -- if anybody else had any thoughts.

21 MS. ALABACK: Rob, do you need time to  
22 calculate and get back with the other two vendors to  
23 find out what their price would be by adding the  
24 other two streets and the traffic control?

25 MR. DEORIO: The other two streets we have.

1 MR. GRAHAM: We have what the costs would be  
2 and the contract documents allow us to adjust it. I  
3 would guess that Northstar has 24,560, and the  
4 maintenance of traffic, Superior fourteen-five. I  
5 would -- can't speak for them, but if they were  
6 looking at second or third place and all of the  
7 sudden they're being lowest and best and awarded the  
8 project I would think they would both be fine with  
9 that award.

10 MS. ALABACK: I think we would have to  
11 confirm that before we award a contract price. We  
12 can't sign an amount without knowing what it is.

13 MR. GRAHAM: Right.

14 MS. ALABACK: Do you need to schedule another  
15 meeting?

16 MR. DEORIO: Is that a phone call you can  
17 make now?

18 MR. GRAHAM: I can go call Northstar right  
19 now.

20 MR. DEORIO: Okay.

21 MR. GRAHAM: I haven't shared the bid  
22 package, number one, because Ohio Revised Code I  
23 can't before the award is made.

24 MR. DEORIO: But could the question be -- I  
25 guess Mr. Boyer could weigh in, but to me the

1 question would be, In looking at your bid docs you  
2 bid, you know \$24,560 for traffic maintenance. If we  
3 were to add two additional streets to that, would  
4 that number remain the same. Could that question be  
5 asked?

6 MR. BOYER: Yeah, I believe that that's just  
7 a clarifying question on the bid. I think that  
8 question can be asked and they can clarify that and  
9 that helps us to consider what we need to do here.

10 MR. GRAHAM: Okay. I can -- do you want to  
11 recess for five minutes, something like that? I'd be  
12 happy to go over to my desk and make that call.

13 MS. ALABACK: Okay.

14 MAYOR WILDER: Sure. We can make a motion  
15 or, yeah, we can make a -- amend our time.

16 MR. DEORIO: You could stay -- we can stay  
17 active here, we just won't talk about anything, but  
18 go see.

19 MR. GRAHAM: I'll go step out and I'll be  
20 right back.

21 MS. ALABACK: I'm going to go grab my phone.

22 MR. DEORIO: It's too much to turn the  
23 meeting off and turn the meeting back.

24 So there's a few people stepping out of the  
25 room, Wayne. We're going to stay live in the meeting

1 while we're waiting for some information to come  
2 back. So we'll probably just be quiet for now.

3 MR. BOYER: Understood. Thank you, sir.

4 MAYOR WILDER: Mr. Boyer, we're back.

5 MR. BOYER: Excellent.

6 MR. DEORIO: Okay.

7 MR. GRAHAM: I was able to reach the  
8 estimator at Northstar Asphalt. Went over in adding  
9 two streets the exact three quantities that changed  
10 to give his bid. He had his own spreadsheet. The  
11 base is 325,522, which we all have on our sheets. He  
12 would be absolutely willing to hold his 24,560 for  
13 maintenance of traffic. And they would be extremely  
14 excited to be the lowest and best bidder for this  
15 work at \$325,522 plus again we would recommend that  
16 18,150 alternate also be awarded.

17 MS. ALABACK: So what's the total for that?

18 MR. GRAHAM: Total price --

19 MR. DEORIO: I've got 343,672.

20 MR. GRAHAM: Yep.

21 MS. ALABACK: That's what I calculate.

22 MR. GRAHAM: And that would make, if  
23 Northstar Asphalt was to be deemed lowest and best  
24 bidder, the contract amount, including the alternate  
25 and the addition of two streets, would be \$343,672.

1                   If we were to assume Superior would hold  
2                   their MOT, they would be at 346,546.30. So they  
3                   would be \$2,000 more.

4                   MR. DEORIO: Given what I've heard, what I  
5                   see is that where the number where Northstar Asphalt  
6                   would be is that 343,672. And if we were looking at  
7                   Central-Allied, their number is 331,135. Difference  
8                   is \$12,537 additional under Northstar, so we want to  
9                   make the record clear, the numbers that we're talking  
10                  about and difference between it, in my opinion, the  
11                  thoughts that I have concerning this have to do with  
12                  who is the lowest and best, what is the best bid  
13                  here, and taking into consideration some factors  
14                  which we just discussed them for the record, I don't  
15                  believe that the pricing on the quantity on one of  
16                  the most important components to this project have  
17                  been adequately priced by Central-Allied. That gives  
18                  me cause for concern that there would be issues  
19                  surrounding that and that those issues could lead to  
20                  non-performance of a contract and potential  
21                  litigation.

22                  I've looked at the performance of these  
23                  bidders on various projects through the city. I  
24                  believe that with Central-Allied we've had a  
25                  performance record that has led to additional costs

1 to the city and delays on projects that, in my mind,  
2 is a factor in determining what is the best bid. For  
3 those reasons, I would be interested in supporting  
4 the bid as the lowest and best bid for Northstar  
5 Asphalt at 343,672. That's not a motion, that's just  
6 my opinion at this time. But I'll allow the others  
7 to speak.

8 MAYOR WILDER: Well, I would say that, based  
9 on your experience, Mr. DeOrio, and your summation  
10 of, and Rob, your experience with the bidders, I'm  
11 sure they all have their good points or bad points,  
12 if you want to call them that way, but from what I'm  
13 hearing today and what I'm seeing before me in the  
14 numbers, and, again, I think on the experience at  
15 that job with our city administrator that Northstar  
16 would probably carry the -- the bid on this one on  
17 being lowest and best. That's just a summation from  
18 my -- from what I've heard here today.

19 MR. DEORIO: Mr. Boyer, do you feel that  
20 what's been discussed here adequately addresses who  
21 is the lowest and best bid?

22 MR. BOYER: I do. I think that we took all  
23 factors into consideration. And again, to reiterate  
24 an earlier point, I mean, the price number obviously  
25 is an important consideration but it's not the only



1 consideration. And based on your history with  
2 dealing with each of these companies that we've  
3 discussed, I think that we've adequately covered the  
4 factors that we need to consider in relation to each.  
5 And based on your discussion and based on the  
6 experience that the city has had with all of these, I  
7 agree that, based on the information presented to us,  
8 that Northstar is the lowest and best bid that we  
9 have in front of us.

10 MAYOR WILDER: Do you want to make a motion?

11 MR. DEORIO: If there isn't anything else,  
12 then with the chair's indulgence I would make a  
13 motion that the board of control award the general  
14 2021 street maintenance paving program to Northstar  
15 Asphalt, Inc., in the amount of \$343,672 with a  
16 determination that this is the lowest and best bid.

17 MAYOR WILDER: So we have a motion on the  
18 floor as stated by Mr. DeOrio. Could I have a second  
19 to go forward with that motion?

20 MR. BOYER: I'll second.

21 MAYOR WILDER: Seconded by Mr. Wayne Boyer.

22 Any further discussion? If not, I'll call  
23 for a roll call vote.

24 Mr. DeOrio.

25 MR. DEORIO: Yes.

1 MAYOR WILDER: Mr. Wayne Boyer.

2 MR. BOYER: Yes.

3 MAYOR WILDER: Ms. Alaback.

4 MS. ALABACK: Yes.

5 MAYOR WILDER: And Mayor Wilder says yes.

6 The vote -- any that are opposed, say "no."

7 The motion carries four-zero in approving the  
8 contract 2021 street maintenance program to Northstar  
9 Asphalt, Incorporated.

10 Anything else to come before the board? If  
11 not, I'll call for a motion to adjourn.

12 MR. DEORIO: So moved.

13 MAYOR WILDER: So moved by Mr. DeOrion.  
14 Seconded?

15 MS. ALABACK: Second.

16 MAYOR WILDER: By Miss Alaback. All in  
17 favor, say "aye."

18 ("Aye" in unison.)

19 MAYOR WILDER: Opposed? Meeting is  
20 adjourned. Thank you.


