**Recognition of Visitors:**

7. Mr. Snyder: At this time, the Council will recognize anybody wishing to speak to it. Please step forward to the microphone, state your name and address for the record.

Chuck Osborne: 307 Fairview Street SE, North Canton, Ohio. As most everyone in this room is aware, North Canton City Council is made up of seven elected representatives. Members of City Council are elected from each of the City's four wards and three at-Large council members are elected by the voters citywide. Anyone in attendance at a North Canton City Council meeting of yesteryear would be totally at a loss to explain the transformation of North Canton City Council meeting of today. As a member of North Canton City Council in the early part of the last decade, I would like to contrast the transformation I have witnessed in how City Council meetings have changed in this short time. In the good old days, as I would call them, citizens were allowed to speak at the start and conclusion of all four Monday night council meetings. Citizens were welcomed and their input on any issue they desired was heard without time limits or intimidation. Today that is not the case as citizens are time-limited and can only speak on alternating Monday night council meetings and only at the outset of a Council meeting. Council members show little interest in what residents have to say and disparage citizens after they have spoken. Many times I have seen citizens attend a City Council meeting hoping to address their Council representatives in an open forum only to discover that their interest in the process of government occurred on the wrong Monday night of Council. This happened to a resident last week when she was denied a chance to speak openly at last week's public council meeting on an issue under discussion by Council. And of course, residents of the City who pick the correct Monday night meeting to address North Canton City Council will run headlong into North Canton's new Law Director, Tim Fox, when their five minutes are up. Are we paying Mr. Fox the salary he is paid to be a timekeeper and to intimidate citizens of North Canton? Why is Law Director Fox dominating nearly all the dialog on issues before City Council? This is not how North Canton City Council meetings were conducted in the good old days. Mr. Snyder, you are the President of City Council, it is your responsibility to conduct city council meetings. I am at a loss to explain how or why you have chosen to allow the City's Law Director to take control of council meetings. The same question applies to the rest of the members of City Council. Mr. Fox is not an elected representative of the voters of North Canton. Law Directors in the good old days only spoke at City Council meetings when their legal expertise was requested. Law Director Fox should not be making policy and dominating discussions that come before Council. Many of you have seen how past Law Directors conducted themselves: Roy Batista, Tom Treadon, Randy McFarren, Paul Pusateri, and Hans Nilges. North Canton Law Director Fox is out of control and his interferences during the meeting and domination of dialog on issues needs to come to an end. Switching topics, I would like to address two pieces of legislation that are to be voted on tonight. In regards to the proposed tax abatement for Insight Realty, Mr. Snyder, at the end of last week's meetings you announced that North Canton needed revenue enhancement and that you planned to recommend a park levy be placed on the ballot for North Canton taxpayers to consider next year. In light of the fact that citizens have heard all year long of the City's financial plight and now your intention to place a park levy on the ballot in 2014, how can you justify a tax abatement for 15 years for Insight Realty? And to boot, Councilmember Mark Cerreta says that the intended recipients of the real property tax exemption already have a substantial presence in North Canton. Knowing the City's financial plight and now knowing your intentions to ask taxpayers to support a new tax levy for city parks while at the same time moving ahead with a tax exemption to Insight Realty, is insulting to the citizens of North Canton. Ordinance No. 70-13 should be voted down. Lastly, I would like to address the aspects of Ordinance No. 80-13 that

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proposes to retitle the position of Chief Operator – Water Treatment Plant to Superintendent – Drinking Water Plant with a sizable increase in salary for the new position. For several years now one half of the salaries of the City Administrator and the City Engineer have been paid out of the Water Fund. I seriously doubt that Mr. Grimes and Mr. Benekos spend half of their time on water issues. Paying general fund expenses out of enterprise funds I believe is illegal. But assuming that the two highest paid city officials, the City Administrator and City Engineer, do indeed spend one-half of their time on water related issues, as their pay would indicate, why does – why do the City's taxpayers need to fund yet another high-paid position to deal with water issues, titled "Superintendent – Water Treatment Plant"? Ordinance No. 80-13 needs to be reworked and I would urge that it be tabled. Keep the present title of Chief Operator – Water Treatment Plant. There is no reason to create another high level position in water that will be filled with yet another patronage appointment by the Mayor.

Mr. Snyder: Alright, sir, appreciate your comments, and they're noted. I thank you for that. Is there anybody else wishing to speak to the Council this evening? Step forward, state your name and address for the record.

Larry Tripp: 1127 East Maple, North Canton. Two weeks ago, I spoke before Council and was about, or I guess I did break the cardinal rule of going over my five minute speaking limit. Surely rules are rules and they must be followed. After that meeting, I met with Mrs. Werren, Chairperson, Ordinance Rules and Claim Committee, and we briefly went over rules of council in which I expressed my concern, and she explained some things to me which had recently occurred. Since that meeting, I have read and reread the rules of council, and in particular rules of decorum, courtesy and propriety. Inasmuch as I may have challenged the five minute speaking rule, in my opinion these rules are challenged much more frequently by some city employees and/or council members. Maybe my thoughts and understanding of these rules are not correct. And if so, I would welcome someone from Council to further explain that to me: one, Council Meetings, as stated in the rules 7 p.m. – not 7:15, not 7:20, but 7:00 p.m. It seems to be happening with more frequency the 7:00 p.m. starting time is not being followed. Enough said on that. Two, I'm a citizen of North Canton and do not like being considered a guest. My understanding of the word "guest" is a person who is invited to visit or stay in someone's home. I come to council meetings on my own free will, not through an invitation. In my thinking, using the word "guest" instead of resident or citizen of North Canton implies council ownership. Three, guest, oops, there's that word "guest" again. Guests deserve and should expect a courteous, respectful hearing at their - of their comments and concerns regarding matters under Council's jurisdiction. When I spoke two weeks ago, four - four members of Council were chewing gum in front of me, distracting and disruptive to me while I was speaking. A bit trivial maybe, but not when a citizen of North Canton is standing up there speaking or sitting in the audience and listening to others. Hey, maybe that distraction caused me to challenge the five-minute rule. Four, passage paragraph where each speaker should first acknowledge he or she has read and understand Council's rules of decorum, courtesy and propriety and recognition of visitors. Since coming to Council meetings for the past six or seven years, and myself probably speaking seven or eight times, I don't recall myself or anyone else ever having to make that acknowledgement. Either use it or get rid of it. I speak tonight because I sense just a small crack in the rights of individuals of North Canton to freely voice their opinion within the true confines of rules of council. In my opinion, unless corrected, actions and/or comments will only escalate and cause more than embarrassment to North Canton. Rules of Council should be equal to all, including city employees, Council members, guests and North Canton citizens. I did not see that occurring the evening of September 30<sup>th</sup>, nor two weeks ago, and many other Council meetings. Again, maybe a bit trivial, but what is expected from the audience should be expected from those sitting before us. Thank you. Everybody have a good Thanksgiving.

Ordinance No. 71-13 – 3rd Reading – Finance & Property

An ordinance authorizing the Mayor of the City of North Canton upon concurrence of Council, through the Board of Control, to enter into a contract for administering a self-insured health insurance program for the of period December 1, 2013, through November 30, 2014, for the employees of the City of North Canton and declaring the same to be an emergency.

Mr. Snyder: This is the City provided health care coverage for its employees. It will renew on the first day of December as it expires. Mr. Fisher was here, what, three weeks ago and explained it. We have looked at a few other changes, and we're working towards that. If they do change again, we're bound by bargaining unit agreements not to change the genesis too much of it. There's some things that they're trying to tweak in there that we possibly, and if it does we'll bring that back to you and for your consideration. But if there are no questions on that, I would entertain a motion to adopt the third reading of Ordinance No. 71-13.

Mr. Snyder: Now, we have to adopt that on emergency to have it go into effect, do we not? Or does that adopt automatically?

Mr. Snyder: Well, that would be too, wouldn't be too late, though would it not? Doesn't has to be in effect the first of December? Mrs. Kalpac: It has an emergency ...

Mr. Fox: Well, I think because it's an emergency, it would take effect the day after you decide...

Mr. Snyder: So, I will, the rules, I did not have to suspend the rules because this is the third reading. But I would like to have a motion to adopt this on an emergency basis. As time is of the essence, this must be in place on the first day of December, as it will expire on Sunday.

Mrs. Kalpac: This has an emergency clause. There's nothing to suspend or...

Mr. Snyder: Oh, it doesn't? I don't need to do that? It automatically adopts? Mrs. Kalpac: Yes.

Mr. Snyder: Okay. My apologies, Council. Mr. Fox: What we're waiving is normally the three readings.

**Ordinance No. 73-13 – 3<sup>rd</sup> Reading – Community & Economic Development**

An ordinance authorizing an agreement between the City of North Canton and Insight Realty, LLC providing for a real property tax exemption pursuant to Ohio's Community Reinvestment Area program.

Mr. Snyder: Madam Chairman, I rise to a question if I may?

Mrs. Kiesling: Yes.

Mr. Snyder: It was brought up in a public speaks that the City's financial condition doesn't warrant this particular investment. The City's waiver is for \$138 per year for fifteen years, which is roughly ...

Mrs. Kiesling: 7200.

Mr. Snyder: \$7,200. The estimated annual projected income tax is in excess of \$12,000 per year. So it is a net gain of almost \$9,000 per year, on the minimal amount of employment. So we're not just ... dealing out the money just willy-nilly it is an investment. The City's investment on the tax is \$483.00. So let the record state that so it's clear that we're not giving it away the farm so to speak. And the reasons why were articulated in the meeting prior to. Thank you for that courtesy. Thank you. Any comment?

**Ordinance No. 78-13 – 1<sup>st</sup> Reading – Finance & Property**

An ordinance to make temporary appropriations for current expenses and other expenditures of the City of North Canton, Ohio, for the period beginning January 1, 2014 and ending December 31, 2014 and declaring the same to be an emergency.

Mr. Snyder: This is the first reading of the temporary budget. There have been some changes already made into that budget there's a - we're moving along. It is a work in progress. Some of it has been reduced. I was looking for my little - you did receive a little note from Director Grimes explaining some of the things relative to that. Also, there was a request from the Chairman of Personnel that the title of Administrative Director of Administrative Services be eliminated from that and that money is not in the budget. So that money and the explanation on the attempt of the reason why the increase of pay for the Water Superintendent is in there. It has to be done. And there, I believe there is also an explanation on the mowing. And again, these are all temporary things. They're a work in progress. We do need to put some budget in place by January 1. Unlike the Federal Government, we don't all shut down on the first day of January. So we'll do that. I know there were questions, Member Werren had some questions relative to the firing range and we're working on that. We hope to bring that back to you on the 9<sup>th</sup> when we re-read this again. And we'll have those questions. And if you have any questions or any - please make some marginal notes in there that we can bring it up at the next Council of the Whole and talk about it. If there's things that you think need to be put in there, or added. My statement in passing to you was not given to you lightly when I talked about a park levy last week. It was briefly spoken of. Park line item this year is

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\$860,000. Parks are a necessary thing in economic development in this City. It is imperative that we keep them in shape. It is imperative that they be state-of-the-art to provide not only for the citizenry, but for people coming into the City. That is one of the first things everyone wants to know what type of recreation we have for their family. It's - in order to do that we need additional revenue. And that's a large chunk. And it is - people that use the parks are willing to pay for the parks. Thinking about a 1 to a 1½ mil levy, it generates just upwards bumping up against the \$800,000 - about 700 and some. We haven't figured out exactly. But that's not a Band-Aid; that will take us at least out five years. We've look to put that levy on in five year sunset. Put it on for five years and see how it's going. That would be designated totally for park operations and improvements. There's a lot of things that have to be done. In the general fund it's tough to support that without looking at different tax increases. So we felt that was the best way to look at that. And again, that will be something that will have to be considered early January as we have to have it down there in place 90 days prior to the election. So we'll be looking at that our first meeting in January, and I'll be to give - I'd like to be able to get with Chairman Foltz and Mr. Peters because they both have long-range ideas and hopes for the park along with Mr. Cerreta, Mrs. Werren, and Mrs. Kiesling, and make sure that that money gets marked for some of those ideas that your constituency has - and Mr. Griffith too. I wouldn't forget you, Danny. In fact, I was going to make you Chairman of the Ad Hoc Committee. But I know - but we'll talk about that, so that will be on there. But if there's no questions from Council relative to the temporary budget, we'll approve it. And Mayor, do you have any input on there? Is there any questions?

Mayor Held: Yes, I just wanted to clarify. When we're looking at the positions, Mr. Osborne had mentioned about, you know, a patronage job, and I want to clarify that when we're hiring in the City, when you look at other municipalities that, you know, that are struggling, and we are struggling, we're just not struggling as much as the other municipalities are. And when you look again, and I know I've said this over and over, but we've cut our work force by 23 percent from 116 full-time employees down to, was it 92, 93, that amount varies. So we're learning to do more with less. This evening, we just hired two new part-time paramedics. Well one paramedic and one part-time EMT. I mean the reason this City does so well financially is because we keep our personnel very, very low by comparison to other cities. In addition to that, our labor agreements allow us to hire part-time employees in the Fire Department, in the EMS, and in the Police, which is a tremendous savings to the City. In addition to that, when you're looking at the Water Treatment Plant, we have union employees, or classified employees, and we have exempt, and what was referred to this evening as a patronage job, you have exempt employees. The reason that you have that is because they're in charge of their department. And they do not have the same protection as far as the labor agreement. So if they're doing a bad job, they're able to be removed. That's why it's set up that way. But they are responsible. They're responsible for that Water Treatment Plant. So when we're looking at the Water Superintendent, he's in charge of seven drinking water plant operators which used to be, I believe, twelve to fourteen. We cut that in half. We used to have two drinking water plant operators on every shift. 24/7. Now, we're down to one. And, occasionally you can have overlap depending on the schedule, right. But we're down to seven drinking water plant operators that man the drinking water of - how many households do we have now on our drinking water in our, you know, we have over seventeen thousand people certainly in our customers for our Drinking Water Plant. But the responsibility is tremendous for the Drinking Water Plant. They're responsible for every drop of water that's pumped out of the ground, sent to the Water Treatment Plant, treated through a very, very sophisticated chemical process, and then distributed out to the residents and businesses, and then tested on a regular basis to meet the Ohio EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) requirements. So this individual that we're putting in as Water Superintendent is not what I would consider to be a political patronage job. It is a very sophisticated position that requires a tremendous amount of responsibility, and they are responsible 24/7. If they go on vacation to Florida, they're still responsible for those individuals; just as Mike Grimes is responsible and Jim Benekos is responsible whether they are here in the City or not. They are responsible 24/7. And the same as our Council members. It doesn't matter the amount of time that you're sitting here in the Chambers. You're still responsible. So I just wanted to clarify that, that we have, we really have significantly reduced the number of full-time

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employees. We have expanded the number of our part-time employees as much as we can because it's the most cost-efficient way to provide city services right now. And every person that we hire, we are seeking the best and most qualified, most talented people that we can put in those positions. So when we're looking for a pay rate, an increase in the pay range, we want to make sure that we're getting the most experienced person that we can. Could we hire somebody at a lower rate? Yes. But they're not going to have the experience that we expect here in the City. So, thank you for allowing me to just cover that, and ...

President Snyder: Mayor, I think that it's the point that has to be presented also. Is that in this particular budget, there are quite a few capital pieces of equipment for the different departments that request it that will make a more efficient operation. It will actually be, not only safer, but more efficient. And as a credit to the department heads that they're requesting equipment that is not only safe for the men in their charge, but also puts the work ahead of the times. We're moving, getting the work done with less men and women in this ...inaudible...

Mayor Held: Absolutely.

Mr. Snyder: And it is a credit to all department heads in their budget requests, and we were able to fulfill those budget requests because of the fact of that. So we want to make that publically known.

Mayor Held: Thank you.

Mr. Snyder: Any other questions of Council relative to the budget? If not, as I say, we'll be reading this again on the 9<sup>th</sup>. So if you have any questions.

Mr. Foltz: And we'll talk about it next week at committee?

Mr. Snyder: Right. We'll be in committee again next week.

Mrs. Kiesling: No, we won't.

Mr. Snyder: Oh, it's on the 9<sup>th</sup>.

Mrs. Kiesling: So, really you really should have your questions answered well ahead, because we're going to do committee on the 9<sup>th</sup> and...

Mr. Snyder: We're going to do a committee prior to the meeting Committee on the 9<sup>th</sup>. Next week, we'll be doing an installation meeting on the 2<sup>nd</sup>, and then on the 9<sup>th</sup> we'll have a meeting on the 9<sup>th</sup>.

Mr. Foltz: I didn't know we were going to have a committee meeting. Okay.

Mr. Grimes: Correct. And that's a range. Not that we're going to offer that. That's just a range that we play with. Superintendent, again, is not adding that we're changing it instead of Chief Operator. We've had it numerous ways. In fact, the job

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description that Clemans & Nelson did for us, he called it Water Superintendent, just like we had it with Rich. So I'm just trying to clarify that, and just get a title there.

You know, we've been talking for well over a year to get Eric more help and they've been doing a great job as short staffed as they are, as all the department heads have, quite frankly. So. Mr. Snyder: Mr. Peters:

Mr. Peters: No report. Just happy holidays.

Mr. Snyder: Mrs. Werren.

Mrs. Werren: Just a couple of quick comments. Larry, I appreciate your comments and I know that we did talk about the time limits, and I think we're all going to make a conscious effort. We've been talking about it before that and it's important for all of us to be timely as well. And it is - I wanted to have the rules of decorum up there. I know we talked about that as well. And I didn't talk to Gail on time, so that was my fault. But I'm working on it, so I do appreciate your comments. And that's it.

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Mr. Snyder: Thank you. Mr. Griffith.

Mr. Griffith: Larry, Stephanie is back there reminding us of the time. So I want to give her credit for that too. Well thought. I want apologize, I'm not going to be here next Monday. I will be coming back from my parents' place. So I apologize, but all the best to each of you, and happy holidays - Happy Thanksgiving.

Mrs. Kiesling: You won't be here at the swearing in?

Mr. Griffith: I won't. I will be in Alaska.

Mr. Snyder: Godspeed to you in your trip.

Mrs. Kiesling: I know. I didn't know when it was. That will be awesome.

Mr. Griffith: It's a long way. It takes a long time to get back and forth. Very good.

Mr. Snyder: Mr. Cerreta

Mr. Cerreta: No report. Happy Holiday.

Mr. Snyder: Thank you. Mrs. Kiesling

Mrs. Kiesling: No report.

Mr. Snyder: I have a couple of things. I would just like to remind Council prior to your swearing in, the Clerk next Monday will, I think the canvas board meets tomorrow at the Board of Elections to certify the elections which in turn will give you an election certificate. However, before you can get your election certificate certified so you can be sworn in, you must have your financial statement completed and filed at the Board of Elections. The filing deadline is the 13<sup>th</sup> of December. However, to take office it must be in place. That's a little known glitz in the State Law, making sure that you filed that. So, you have until, by next Monday at 4:00 p.m. or I think it's 4 or 4:30 that they close. Make sure it's filed.

Mr. Peters: Jon, can you do that online?

Mr. Snyder: You can do that online, yes.

Mrs. Werren: Are you sure?

Mr. Snyder: Yes, you can file online.

Mr. Peters: I know the Ethics Commission, you can do on line.

Mr. Snyder: Yeah, you can file.

Mrs. Kiesling: They have to stamp it and all that. I don't think you can.

Mr. Snyder: Yeah, you can file on line.

Mrs. Kiesling: Can you file on line?

Mr. Snyder: You just scan it. You can get the form off the internet and scan it and send it.

Mrs. Kiesling: Really?

Mr. Snyder: And, if you have any questions, call Theresa Large at the Board of Elections, she's in charge of that. I know, I'm getting mine ready. I didn't file it yet. And of course depending on the amount you spend, if you do not spend \$1,000, I don't think you're required

Mr. Peters: Oh no, you're not. That's right.

Mr. Snyder: There's an exemption, I think it's a thousand dollars. I'm not... Don't quote me on that, but you might check just to make sure. Because...

Mr. Peters: You still have to dissolve your committee.

Mr. Snyder: Yeah. If you have a committee, you have to dissolve it.

Mrs. Kiesling: You don't have to.

Mr. Snyder: If you keep it open, you have to file every year.

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Mrs. Kiesling: Right. That's what I've always done.

Mr. Cerreta: Don't forget to put your address on it, too.

(Laughter)

Mr. Foltz: I was going to say Mark, you ought to file online and then go down there in person.

(Laughter)

Mr. Peters: We'll go down there together, Mark.

Mr. Snyder: That's one thing. The other thing that we got that – next Monday we'll be meeting at 6:30, and what we're going to do because of time involved in it, we're going to – I've decided to put the work session and the regular council meeting together on the 9<sup>th</sup>. And so we hopefully will meet, that depending probably 6 o'clock on that Monday. I know it's tough for Mrs. Kiesling sometimes, but...

Mrs. Kiesling: No doubt, I'll be here by 6.

Mr. Snyder: Well, we may go to 6:30, but right now tentatively, it's a very small agenda. There's I believe two items that right now, but by that following Monday could be some other items, but we will be considering that moving to a council meeting right afterwards. So that's next Monday at 6:30. I believe the Mayor has the honorable Frank Forchione ready to do the ceremony. Take care of that. And then lastly, the last couple of years, and I didn't, I forgot to mention this, but the Fireman's Dependency Board will meet on the 15<sup>th</sup>. Mr. Foltz and I have had the privilege of serving on that Board. Do you want to do that again, Mr. Foltz?

Mr. Foltz: Yes.

Mr. Snyder: And I would like, if some member of Council would like to serve on that Board, simply it's a State law that you have to – they meet and they talk in case there is any, God forbid, a death on the, in the act of a fire, that it's handled so that somebody is answerable to the State to the surviving family of the firefighter that was injured, whether it be he or she but ....

Mr. Foltz: That's December 16<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 p.m.

Mr. Snyder: Right. If somebody would like to – it's a short meeting. It's about what, a half an hour? Captain Coen and former Chief Bacon, Fire Prevention Chief Bacon's, on that Board, and I believe one other firefighter. I'm not sure, and then two members of Council. That's set by the State. And so I'd like someone to do that. And I'll ask the Clerk to forward that to Captain Coen so he knows who's coming.

Mr. Foltz: I'll be there.

Mr. Snyder: Yeah, Mr. Foltz will be there. Is anybody else interested.

Mr. Foltz: Gail, will you give us a reminder, too.

Mr. Cerreta: Where's it at?

Mr. Snyder: The Fire Department.

Mr. Cerreta: I'm good.

Mr. Snyder: Okay. And then Member Cerreta and...

Mr. Foltz: It's 6 o'clock, December 16<sup>th</sup>.

Mr. Snyder: Here it is.

Mr. Foltz: Because I made most of them. Sometimes ...inaudible...

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Mr. Snyder: I have a conflict and I've got to pass. So you'll forward that to Captain Coen at – those two names that Member Cerreta and Foltz will be there at the meeting. Thank you very much for that. Okay, continuing reports. Director of Law.

**Reports:**

Mr. Fox: Yes, sir. There were some questions and requests for some updates on the Mayor's Court tax collection program. And Gayle Bruce, from our Tax Department, although the program started I believe in October of last year, the numbers that she put together represent from January 1<sup>st</sup> through November 6<sup>th</sup> of this year. And the amount collected represents 210 tax years from 2006 through 2012 in actual cash payments that we received is \$45,492. There are payment agreements that have resolved through remaining that's outstanding on those cases for approximately \$63,000, and then the penalties and interest from this timeframe doubled even considering the entire year from last year, it's just under \$64,000. So the tax collection program from January up through the first week of November results in approximately \$172,000 in collections. So, it's running along.

Mr. Snyder: That's good money.

Mr. Fox: Yes, sir. It's running along really well with Gayle Bruce in the Tax Department, and then Jane Housos, our Mayor's Court Clerk. So clicking along very well.

Mr. Snyder: That's very good.

Mr. Fox: Very helpful with Magistrate Nist overseeing those.

Mr. Snyder: Good. Appreciate it. That's very good. Thank you for that.

Mr. Fox: That's it. Thank you.

Mr. Snyder: Director Alger

Mrs. Alger: We had an exciting afternoon. We got all our pay stubs emailed. And that's putting us into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century, so we're kind of happy. You guys will all be = all employees will be receiving email pay stubs starting the first pay in 2014. So I just wanted to let you all know that it's working. e tested all the various: Yahoo, gmail, AT&T, Warner Cable all of it or whatever it's called...

Mr. Snyder: Road Runner.

Mrs. Alger: Road Runner. And then also, I just want to thank all the department heads, since they are here, and Council President, and of course Director Grimes here for helping resolve the temporary budget and we get to start all over in January with the permanent budget. That's it.

Mr. Snyder: You know, on behalf of the Council, I would like you to extend our thanks to the payroll, and I apologize for the word clerk, to Sarah. I mean we've had no visible complaints from employees, from the administration, and she's done so, and we do want to – that this side of the building seems to be running smoothly over here so we're very - we caught up to the other side now. We're all pulling on the same oar. We do appreciate it. Thank you very much for that. Director Grimes.

Mr. Grimes: Like Karen said, the department heads were here tonight. They're available any if you've got a question on their budget or whatever, feel free to call them or ask them or meet them or whatever, they'll be happy to explain why they asked for what they did and what they're planning to do. So we had a test run with our new salting procedures over the weekend. So it sounds like we're going to have another bigger test this week on them. And the Engineer and I, even though it's snowing and cold out, we spent an afternoon in with our Federal and State friends from the Army Corps and Muskingum Watershed still meeting on the Zimber Ditch. So we're still after that too, sir. So...

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Mr. Snyder: You know, it's very enlightening to read on the front page of today's paper, the City of North Canton was prudent in the purchase of their salt at \$28 a ton versus \$48 a ton, which is probably a savings of near \$100,000. So our hats are off to the Administration and ...

Mr. Grimes: I think that Mr. Davis has some other plans that's going to cut that usage back a little bit too and still get the same job done and save us some money.

Mr. Snyder: It's pretty hard to just throw \$100,000 down a rat hole like that. And we're fortunate. So that didn't go unnoticed. We appreciate that. Mayor.

Mayor Held: Yes. We do have down at the, it's not likely that you'll be down there feeding the ducks, it's a little cold out there right now, but if you are down there, you'll see that we have the new decks, brick pavers with the patios along - there's four of them now, Jim.

Mr. Benekos: Three.

Mr. Grimes: Three.

Mayor Held: Three. We have three of those. And actually they were done by Eagle Scouts which was even more impressive. So they put a lot of work into it, a lot of time and of effort. So we're going to have those young men up here and recognize them for the work that they did. Also too, we can arrange, from what I understand from the Chief, we can have the emergency weather alert notifications for the residents. They can sign up for those from the County. Yeah, the County Emergency Management. And the reason that I'm bringing that up is I have it set up on my phone, and you know when you're having the storm weather watch, I've had like three notifications today. So it's a nice service. So if any of the Council members or our residents want to sign up for that, I think it's a great service and at no cost. That's all I have.

Mr. Snyder: Thank you. Mr. Engineer.

Mr. Benekos: Just a few items. We heard late last week we were successful in our joint application with the County to repave Applegrove for next year. So that will be repaved from Main Street to the west in the City then continue west out of the City on the County's portion, then a portion of Whipple. Just a reminder, we also have a joint project with the County Engineer's Office to pave Everhard Road, but that won't take effect, or be done probably until 2016 or 2017. That's in conjunction with the rebuilding of the intersection at Whipple and Everhard. And we are looking at Portage and possible funding sources for that in the future. So and we're working on that.

Mr. Snyder: Jim, I - you say they continue on Applegrove westwardly. And what's their intention? You're going to choke all that traffic down to a two-lane, and they're planning on a million square feet of retail going in there next spring. How do they intend to move that traffic across a two-lane road? And that bridge without..

Mr. Benekos: Well, that would be a future project. The County, different entities in the County, Regional Planning Commission, the County Engineer, the townships, North Canton, we had a study just completed in the northern area. And we started that last year. In the event of the growth in that area and the different traffic improvements that would need to be made to handle that growth. That recommendation is out. I can get you the web site for that. You can look at that. They made several recommendations. One is to increase the bridge of Applegrove over I-77. But that won't take place for several years. And the roadway is in need of paving at this time.

Mr. Snyder: Well, now will we be successful? I've noticed in that area that the new medical building will have our water, but will that new retail have our water? We'll come across Heiser's land there where we ran across and go into that, correct?

Mr. Benekos: We're working with them on that. We're confident that they will have our water.

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Mr. Snyder: Well good.

Mrs. Kiesling: I have a question. What's the plan for Everhard and Whipple? Are they thinking of widening, or are they just redoing it?

Mr. Benekos: I believe it's widening and reconstructing that interchange, replacing the bridge just to the east or parallel to the railroad tracks.

Mr. Cerreta: The cul de sac kind of thing that goes under...

Mrs. Kiesling: Right.

Mr. Benekos: Right. So I haven't seen the full plans at the intersection. I know there's a couple of options they were looking at. One was kind of wild with the ramp onto 77, but I don't believe that will happen with a hotel there.

Mr. Snyder: Well some place you have to allow egress for that hotel. There's no possible way they can exit onto the on ramp with the expressway, they'd be crashing into each other. So they'd have to go north to come back south.

Mr. Benekos: Well, I'm not sure what their plan is there. Like I say, they had a couple of options, and they're still, well they just started the engineering on that. So...

Mr. Snyder: I noticed the bowling alley just went up for sale - three million dollars. So obviously, it must be getting ready to take that land and do a third hotel there.

Mrs. Kiesling: Three million dollars?

Mr. Snyder: Three million - three twenty-six, I believe to be exact. That's a lot of money. Any other member of Council wishing to speak? If not, I wish you all a very happy Thanksgiving. And Member Griffith, we wish you Godspeed and a safe trip. Bring us some crabs back from Alaska.

Mr. Griffith: We're going to be a long way from the ocean.

Mayor Held: Salmon.

Mr. Snyder: Salmon, that's it, king salmon.

Mr. Peters: Moose.

Mrs. Werren: Bear.

Mrs. Kiesling: Bear.
