COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: I'd like to call to order the Council Meeting Monday, September 29, 2014 at 7:45pm.

MAYOR HELD: Mr. President, I think our pastor was nervous.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: You stuck it out I appreciate you sticking it out.

PASTOR STEVE MARSHALL: I learned a lot.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Pastor Steve Marshall, Mission View Church. Welcome.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Clerk, please call the roll?

Roll call vote of 6 yes to excuse Councilman Cerreta.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: At this time if you wish to address council please step forward state your name and address.

MIRIAM BAUCHMAN: 320 Weber Avenue. I've been attending council meetings for around 10 years. There has always been a structure to the legislation. The charter has been followed, the rules of council have been followed, the ordinances. I feel tonight that the rules of council are not being followed. On Friday I received the agenda for both meetings and for the agenda for the council meeting it was all listed out everything to be voted on. And what the rules of council say is nothing can be put on the agenda until it goes through committee first. So what was on the agenda had never been committee. In the years that I've been here I've seen it be discussed and then be rules of council are waived or amended and then it's put on. And I want to thank Doug for saying not to have a meeting and then a half hour later pass it. That's not fair to the residents of North Canton, they're not kept in the loop that way and for transparency and honest government you need to give them a chance to know what's going on. COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Is there anyone else wishing to address please step forward state your name and address. Okay, seeing none we'll move onto old business. May I have a motion and a second to read by title only the third reading of

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: So moved.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to read by title only Ordinance No. 61 - 2014.

9. Ordinance No. 61 – 2014

Community & Economic Development Committee

An ordinance authorizing the Mayor of the City of North Canton to enter into an Industrial and Commercial Occupancy Grant Agreement with Sanctuary Media Group.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Chairperson Kiesling.

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: Yes, this is the final reading we're very excited of the new company coming into the building across the street. They have merged with another company in the meantime and they're going to have more employees. We are approving a four year occupancy grant, 50% of the total cost of the four year is \$24,960. And they have signed a 10 year lease with IRG which is pretty awesome. So we're very excited and I motion that we adopt.

COUNCILMAN FOLTZ: Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes for the adoption of the third reading.

ORDINANCE NO. 61 – 2014 WAS PASSED BY A ROLL CALL VOTE OF 6 YES.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Thank you.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: Mr. President, could we as a matter of I tend to agree with Miriam from a rule standpoint so from a prafuntuary standpoint she would put on the record a motion to amend the agenda add the following items that we just discussed. Will you enter a motion?

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Yes, I'll entertain a motion to amend the agenda.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: Alright, I would Mr. Chairman; move that we would add Resolution No. 72 – 2014, 73 – 2014, 74 – 2014 and 76 – 2014 to tonight's council agenda.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Is there a second?

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: I'll second it but we'll need to also waive the rules requiring a committee report as well so but I'll second this motion. Can we put it all together?

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: Yeah, I'll amend my motion to...

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: Right, two separate...

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Two separate we'll do two separate motions. We have a second on that.

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: Second.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Yep.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: This is the motion to suspend the rules.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: No, this is a motion to amend the agenda.

COUNCILMAN FOLTZ: Amend the agenda to include these ordinances.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: To include these items.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: Okay, I see what you're saying.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Please call the roll.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to amend the agenda to include Resolution No. 72 – 2014, Ordinance No. 73 – 2014, Ordinance No. 74 – 2014 and Ordinance No. 76 – 2014.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Thank you and I'll entertain a motion and a second to suspend the rules of council requiring a committee report for said ordinances.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: So moved.

COUNCILWOMAN WERREN: Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to suspend the rules of council requiring a committee report for said ordinances.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Thank you very much. May I have a motion and a second to read by title only the first reading of Resolution No. 72 – 2014?

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: So moved.

COUNCILMAN FOLTZ: Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to read by title only Resolution No. 72 – 2014.

10. New Business.

11. Resolution No. 72 – 2014 Personnel and Safety Committee

A resolution authorizing the Mayor of the City of North Canton to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) by and between the City of North Canton Police Department and the University of Akron Research Foundation to join and be a participating member of the Stark County OVI Task Force, and declaring the same to be an emergency.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Yes, as we spoke earlier this I believe is going to be our fourth year entering into this partnership. We've brought Member Fonte up to speed in regards to this and we've had good results from this. Our police chief and the police department as a whole are behind this 100%. So if there's no other input I'll entertain a motion to second to adopt the first reading of Resolution No. 72 – 2014.

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: A motion.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to adopt the first reading of Resolution No. 72 – 2014.

RESOLUTION NO. 72 – 2014 WAS GIVEN FIRST READING.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Thank you, may I have a motion and a second to read by title only the first reading of Ordinance No. 73 – 2014.

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: So moved.

COUNCILWOMAN WERREN: Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to read by title only Ordinance No. 73 – 2014.

12. Ordinance No. 73 – 2014 Street and Alley Committee

An ordinance authorizing the Mayor of the City of North Canton, through the Board of Control, to enter into a Supplemental Sewer Agreement with the City of Canton for the Allenford Drive Sewer Improvements Projects, at the City of North Canton's total cost not to exceed \$50,000.00, and declaring the same to be an emergency.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Chairman Fonte?

COUNCILMAN FONTE: That's one we just discussed a little while ago in regards to the 1,000 foot a line. We're going to pay \$1.89 percent of the amount of like \$2.5 million. And it's necessary to be done because it's collapsing; falling apart and there's a report here if you need to read it. But I recommend we move forward with that.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Is that a motion?

COUNCILMAN FONTE: Yes, I make...

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to adopt the first reading of Ordinance No. 73 – 2014.

ORDINANCE NO. 73 – 2014 WAS GIVEN FIRST READING.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Alright, thank you. May I have a motion and a second to read by title only the first reading of Ordinance No. 74 – 2014?

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: So moved.

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to read by title the first reading of Ordinance No. 74 – 2014.

13. Ordinance No. 74 – 2014 Water, Sewer and Rubbish Committee

An ordinance amending Ordinance No. 6 – 2014, the Lime Slaker Replacement Project at the City of North Canton Drinking Water Treatment Plant, increasing the appropriation from not to exceed \$140,000.00 to not to exceed \$330,000.00.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: We had good committee discussion on this. I would it was quite enlightening for me if for pronunciation if nothing else. I would move for its adoption.

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to adopt the first reading of Ordinance No. 74 – 2014.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Okay, since we've already suspended the rules requiring a committee report do I need to do that again for this one? Okay, may I have a motion and a second to adopt under suspension of the rules Ordinance No. 74 – 2014?

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: So moved.

COUNCILWOMAN WERREN: Second.

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: Why are we do that?

COUNCILMAN FONTE: Is that you wanted to see the legal...

COUNCILWOMAN WERREN: Do you mean the...

COUNCILMAN FOLTZ: That wasn't lime...

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: No, this is the Slaker.

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: The Slaker doesn't have the emergency in the legislation...

LAW DIRECTOR FOX: It's not required to you're only doing an appropriation it becomes law.

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: Oh that's right, that's right.

LAW DIRECTOR FOX: You've already suspended the rules for a committee report he's asking for waiving the rule...

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: I mean is it truly necessary...

LAW DIRECTOR FOX: It's not an emergency. It's an appropriation, an appropriation becomes law as soon as it's and you're simply waiving the rules requiring a committee report and three readings. But it's not an emergency.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: This is a single appropriation.

LAW DIRECTOR FOX: Yes.

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: Right, I was out of turn with you I apologize.

LAW DIRECTOR FOX: No problem.

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: I'm just trying to get it right on that one.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Okay, did we have a motion on that?

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: I did motion.

COUNCILWOMAN WERREN: But we don't need it then.

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: to waive the...

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: To adopt under suspension of the rules.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: To adopt.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: I need a motion and a second.

COUNCILWOMAN WERREN: We had the motion and I second.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: You second? Okay. Please call the roll.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to adopt under suspension of the rules Ordinance No. 74 – 2014.

ORDINANCE NO. 74 – 2014 WAS PASSED BY A ROLL CALL VOTE OF 6 YES.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Thank you. And may I have a motion and a second to table Resolution No. 75 – 2014?

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: Do we need to or can we just wait...

COUNCILMAN FONTE: Well, you wanted to look at the legalese.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: Well actually we have not approved it to the agenda to add it to the agenda.

COUNCILMAN FOLTZ: Right, you didn't.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Yeah that's right we have not.

COUNCILMAN FOLTZ: It's not on there.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Alright, my apologies. May I have a motion and a second to read by title only the first reading of Ordinance No. 76 - 2014?

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: So moved.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to adopt the first reading of Ordinance No. 76 – 2014.

14. Ordinance No. 76 – 2014

Finance and Property Committee

An ordinance authorizing the Mayor of the City of North Canton, to enter into an agreement between the City of North Canton and Stark County Park District (Stark Parks) to participate and provide the City's share in the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP), and declaring the same to be an emergency.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: I actually had two additional questions on this. Is it do we need to do this on emergency? I imagine we do.

COUNCILMAN FONTE: I think time is of the essence only because this has been going on for like 18 months to get the money and another year or so. It needs to...

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: I'm okay but I just wanted to make sure we got it on the record too.

COUNCILMAN FONTE: Yeah, it, it... they want to get started on this right away so...

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: But we need to make sure we have Doug's vote.

COUNCILMAN FOLTZ: I'm not going to vote for it.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Yeah, no, what if we need a special meeting next Monday we'll do a special meeting and do it. If the emergency clause is still in there but we're only doing the first reading.

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: Right.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: Okay.

COUNCILMAN FOLTZ: I'm going to vote for it at the special meeting.

COUNCILMAN FONTE: Yeah, we can do that then that would be great.

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: Yeah, that's fine.

COUNCILMAN FOLTZ: I'll vote first reading only.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: The other question I had was or comment is it sounds like we might not have to spend the full \$60,000 if some people might not participate.

COUNCILMAN FONTE: No, I believe if I'm not Jim's not here but I believe we're committed to \$60,000. It's just if they don't take the buyout if the appraisal's not right it will roll to the next person and the next person.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: We're assuming...

COUNCILMAN FONTE: So, so, they're using up the \$1.5 million dollars and our contribution is \$60,000.

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: I forgot to ask that in the initial meeting so I would...

COUNCILMAN FOLTZ: That's goes back to 2013 too.

COUNCILMAN FONTE: It does way before me. But what, what they were trying to do is break it into two pieces because they didn't think it was going to be able happen quick enough. But the way they're talking it's going to happen back to back.

MAYOR HELD: And this is just too kind of clarify the process a little bit. We had the City of North Canton provided our information as far as the impacted homes that were regularly being flooded. There were some that were had a greater impact over the years. Stark Parks, they are the ones that applied for the mitigation grant; they are the ones Bob Fonte who determines the methodology for evaluating those impacted homes. And when the list came out as far as what homes would be first on the list you know 1 through 5 and then 6 through 10 and then 10 through 15 and 15 through 20. There were some homes that some homeowners that disagreed with that. There are council members, myself, the administrator who may not agree with the order of priority however the authority to determine that ranking lies with the Stark County Park District and they determine their methodology for ranking those homes under the direction of FEMA and it could be some other state agency. So with that said council members may feel free to give their input I know that Dominic is going to be meeting with Bob Fonte. I've had numerous conversations with Bob Fonte; I met with Bob Fonte last Friday. Mike Grimes has had a number of conversations with the Park District. But again they make the final determination. When we look at the first and second phase and this is as Bob Fonte had explained to me the way this process works this mitigation grant is that when there is a disaster and the federal government appropriates money for mitigation any excess funds are then they're not given back to the federal government it then goes to state and the state can utilize that money under certain parameters for mitigation or to remove impacted homes. That's how we're getting the first funding for the first 10. Funding for the second 10 is going to be any unspent funds, federal funds as they are then appropriated to the state. And so when will that second phase of funding become available that depends on the federal government's appropriation as it's then appropriated down or passed onto the state. And then of course the state is going to have a series of criteria that they use whether it's going to Cincinnati or Stark County or however they set that up. So the point is that as Dominic mentioned we have funding for the first approximately the first 10 homes depending on the appraisal rates it could be 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 there's, there's you know no fixed number. That's, that's to be you know identified as we moved through the process. So but still this is a great project for the city to approve because hopefully we're, we're going to be able to remove close to 10 homes if the property owners agree. So...

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: I will move its adoption.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: A second?

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to adopt the first reading of Ordinance No. 76 – 2014.

ORDINANCE NO. 76 – 2014 WAS GIVEN FIRST READING.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Alright, thank you. Reports, Member Fonte?

15. Reports – Council:

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: We're at reports, Member Fonte?

COUNCILMAN FONTE: I really don't have anything to report today.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Alright...

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: So that would be no report.

COUNCILMAN FONTE: No report today.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Member Werren?

COUNCILWOMAN WERREN: No report today.

COUNCILMAN FONTE: We had a nice week what can I say?

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Member Kiesling?

COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING: No report.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Member Griffith?

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: I have three items one for each of you. One of the first was in a sermon this week we talked about clean water it came up one way or the other and I just wanted to say how blessed we are to live in a community where not only do have clean water but really, really good water. And it's always good to remember the good things and I just wanted to say how much I appreciate the work that people here at this table do and the work the people down at the various lime fields that make the magic happen etc., etc.

COUNCILWOMAN WERREN: The Slaker fields?

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: Yeah, the Slaker fields right, yeah. Anyway I appreciate it even if I don't completely understand it of course. Right? The second was we had really good, productive long meeting this afternoon relative to the 2015 budget and I think we're going to be talk well I know that we will be talking about that some more too. But I wanted to say thanks to Karen, Mike, the mayor was there as well thanks to him as well and I think we're making some good progress. And I again our goal this year was try to get ahead of the curve on it. I think we're doing really well there as well. So that was good. And finally Mark and I were scheduled to have some discussions relative to the pool we're going to have to put those off a little I think too but we're making some progress there as well. So that's all I have.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Member Foltz?

COUNCILMAN FOLTZ: Yeah, I appreciate Jim sending the letter out for budget for capital improvements. I have a few I'm going to ask for this year in my ward so it's good to get this out early. Hopefully we can utilize those projects within the budget and then also try to get paving done earlier next year if at all possible. With the weather obviously to get done what they need to and we had a great couple of weeks as Dominic mentioned but we want to make sure when do pave our roads that the weather is conducive to the type of capital money we're spending. And if it all possible I'd like to get out earlier next year even in February to know where we're going with the rest of the streets. Maybe that could be part of the budget process the finance committee's working on. So that we can get out early and get the best rates and get locked in. So we know early you know we do an earlier job of it. So that's it. Thank you.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Thank you, just a note here the groundbreaking ceremony for the St. Luke's Lutheran Community is Thursday, October 2nd at 2pm. And we all have a letter in here you need to RSVP if you want to attend. If anyone else wants to attend I think it's going to be a good time. Director of Law?

16. Reports:

LAW DIRECTOR FOX: No report.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Director of Finance?

FINANCE DIRECTOR ALGER: No report.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Director of Administration?

ADMINISTRATION DIRECTOR GRIMES: First, we had a water break a pretty good size one up by Cleveland there was an issue there. And I just wanted to say the employees really did a nice job up there they worked together; they utilized the fire truck and kept the pressure up the whole time that area was not without water. And we also appreciate the residents up there I hear there was homemade cornbread was made and they opened up their homes for restrooms and that type of thing. So we appreciate them putting up with us there. We just got notified salt for the city is going to be \$56.15 a ton. Last year it was \$27.50 a ton. Of course, we couldn't get it last year but that's what the price was. Working on the water tower, AT&T wants to redo their lease up there. You know they're trying to get a cheaper lease about \$4,000 a year I'm still working on that with them. I'm not real excited about losing any money on our tower up there. The new lights that we have in here hopefully you can see a little better. If you get any complaints about our synchronized traffic lights they threw the switch a few days ago and it's synchronized everything on the side street you had to wait two or three times for the light to change before you got out. They still had a problem with that this morning I had them switch it back to normal. They're still working on that. So that's where they're at on that. Marquardt, they're still working on Marquardt they've got some milling down there and then finishing that they should be done in the middle of October on that. So thank you, Mr. Peters.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Thank you, Mr. Mayor?

MAYOR HELD: Yes, Councilman Griffith, I'd like to thank him for the time he took today to work our budget projections with the state auditor also with our finance department with Karen. I think the meeting was very productive it was we were there for about 2.5 hours. And I think it just demonstrates the what was that?

COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH: It seemed like longer to me.

MAYOR HELD: It seemed like 7.5 hours but I think it's just a representation really of all that's involved when you're looking at a lot of it is just understanding and explaining the different funds and the relationship to each other. And then as it relates to our previous expenditures and our projected expenditures. I think it was very productive and I appreciate you taking the time for that. Also we had in my discussions with Chuck Osborne as far as the traffic during due to the construction I think he had a very good point where as we're going to ask the city and the administrator to place signs to direct the traffic rather than having them just randomly you know go down particular side streets. It's just to manage the traffic during the 45 day construction period. So I appreciate your input on that Chuck. I mean every little bit I think does help. And then also this Sunday we have two walks in the city. The first one the AHIMSA walk, it's the Indian Association in greater Stark County I believe they're going to do and they've held their event here in the city for a number of years already. And this is really a peace walk that's celebrating the work that Gandhi has done and very nice people. Good people and we're just grateful that they picked North Canton every year. So that will be this Sunday at 9:00am, October 5th and that will be at Price Park. And then at 2:00pm we're going to have the Out of the Darkness Suicide Prevention Walk at Memorial Stadium and one of our local residents **their family Laurie Walkso is head has decided to have this. And this was due to her husband that had taken his life unfortunately or**

sadly both last year. Over here at the Rotary Park in North Canton and so Laurie and her two daughters participated in their walk down in Columbus and they thought it was very important to bring this walk to North Canton. And I think what's you know what's so incredible about is this is you have a family that's struggling with very, very deep pain and they're taking that pain that they're struggling with but they're turning it into a positive to do two things. To accomplish two things. #1 it provides support to those families that have lost loved ones that have their lives and secondly to raise money to bring greater awareness to people that are struggling with depression or hopelessness and to prevent that from happening in the future. So that walk will take place starting at 2:00pm and they do have a yoga stretching at 1:44pm to get everybody limber. So hopefully we have good weather for both of those days. But even in the event that we don't we know that we're going to have people there participating. And that's all I have.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Thank you, Mr. Mayor. Council Clerk Bailey?

COUNCIL CLERK BAILEY: I only have one item and that is last Wednesday we had the civil service exam, it went well. So we should have the results of that in a couple of weeks. And that's it.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Thank you, and before we adjourn I'd like to publicly congratulate our reporter Mr. Robert Wang for qualifying for the Boston Marathon.

ROBERT WANG: Many more North Canton residents made it.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Yes there were, yes there were. Well done Robert.

COUNCILMAN FONTE: 26.2 right?

MAYOR HELD: Robert completing a marathon in my book is spectacular. But qualifying for the Boston Marathon that's even more impressive. What was your time?

ROBERT WANG: 3 hours, 12 minutes and 40 seconds.

COUNCILMAN FONTE: You ran that many miles 26.2?

ROBERT WANG: Right.

MAYOR HELD: No rides or anything like that?


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
COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS: Alright, with that I will entertain I'll entertain a motion to adjourn.
