

MINUTES FROM SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING  
CITY OF NORTH CANTON  
MONDAY, FEBRUARY 1, 2016

1. Call to Order

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** I'd like to call to order the Special Council Meeting Monday, February 1, 2016 at 8:05pm.

2. Roll Call

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Clerk, please call the roll?

Roll call found the following council members in attendance: Cerreta, Fonte, Griffith, Kiesling, Peters and Werren. Thus having 6 in attendance.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Alright, thank you very much. At this time, if you wish to address council please step forward state your name and address.

3. Recognition of Visitors

**CHUCK OSBORNE:** 307 Fairview Street SE, North Canton, Ohio. While I was, ladies and gentlemen were in executive session, I did some quick research on my city's website. Which by the way is just atrocious now. I don't know what you've done to it, but it's terrible. At any rate, I'm still plague and in a quandary about these special Council Meetings. I went back to 2012, I just picked a year, to see what an agenda would look at in 2012. On June 4, 2012, that was the very first special council meeting of the year. For some reason now we're having them like every week, every month. I wonder why I'm allowed to speak tonight. I had planned on going back and looking at some minutes cause there are some minutes I recall that the President of Council at the time would say "this is a special Council Meeting, there are no public speaks". Now all of a sudden, we have public speaks. Has Alzheimer, early onset Alzheimer set in on this council body? I wish Mr. Foltz was here, he goes back to yesteryear and this has just occurred in the last couple of years. Mrs. Kiesling should remember as well. Special Council Meetings they were called for a special meeting. You had to identify exactly what was to be discussed and nothing else could come up to be discussed. There were no public comments. So anyway I just brought up the Council Meeting on my cellphone and I'm just comparing the agendas. And you can dial it up on your phones whenever you want to, the meeting is called together, called to order. On the agenda it just says "notice is hereby given that a special meeting of the Council of the City of North Canton will be held Monday, June 4<sup>th</sup> at 6:45pm in the Council chamber at North Canton City Hall. Pursuant to a roll call vote taken at a regular Council Meeting held May 29<sup>th</sup>". We're not doing any of that anymore. We're not doing anything like the old ways. And I thought it was amusing what Mr. Benekos said here. He's counting ahead I need this legislation passed by such and such and if my guesstimate is right we can have it passed by March such and such. Sorry to tell you Mr. Benekos, but that's not going to possible anymore. If you twist and turn and create a schedule which nobody can predict. I don't know what's going on. Why have intelligent, experienced long tenured council people allowed, you just like a bunch of hogs. You get out there and say "suey, suey" and they come running because they know they're going to be fed. And there's the man who's calling out, suey, suey. I used to work on a farm.

**COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING:** You know you can stop him if he's being degrading to us. Cause its getting...

**CHUCK OSBORNE:** Nobody's being mean to you. But whatever Mr. Fox says, whatever he puts in front of you, there has not been one ounce of discussion in four years from you collection of people. Nobody disagrees. And I just scratch my head and thinking "God, some of these people have college degrees". How is it and it must be in our water, how it is we've been able to find 7 people who are unanimous on everything. And have no backbone to say "no, I'm not going along with that". At any rate go back and look at the June 4 and I don't know I was going to create a spreadsheet of all these special council meetings. But you are totally departing from years of tried and true legislative schedules. And it's confusing, number one and sad. Go ahead and grin Mr. Peters. Thank you.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thank you, Mr. Osborne. We did have a roll call vote last meeting to have this special Council Meeting. So we did have that, you know, the reason I'm grinning is because I'm I guess a little surprised that you got a public speaks portion, you're able to come up and speak when you didn't think you'd be able to speak. I thought you'd be pleasantly surprised.

(Mr. Osborne spoke out from the gallery)

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Mr. Osborne, you've had your time. I did not interrupt you, I allowed you to call each and every one of us up here a pig. And I didn't interrupt you. I think I've been rather gracious. Mr. Saylor, before you speak and the reason I'm grinning is, you know, I was going to mention this before public speaks, but one of the things that I wanted to address in regards to the meeting and times is that it would be my suggestion that we stay with the current setup. And not only just stay with the current setup, but add a public speaks portion to each and every meeting. I want it to be open, I want more response and that's going to give you 5 minutes every week. That's why I'm grinning. You are going to get a crack at us every week. I mean you worked you said you worked on a farm. How many farm animals can you call us? Well, in a month time you're going to get 4 cracks at it. That's why I was grinning. I find it hysterical. We had a discussion in committee last

week and all of sudden it, you think it's going be law. We was in discussion, we talked about it. We talked about a lot of different things. So that's going to be my recommendation and as President of Council I run the meetings. I can have public speaks before any meeting I want. And that's what we're going to do. You can come up every Monday. Next week it will be a horse's behind. But, and I will address this as well, seeing that Mr. Saylor is up here. We also discussed cameras. Now that camera issue was discussed because when you first started videotaping, you had it front and center. I've got a picture, I sent it to you. You saw it. You moved that front seat right there and you put it right there and you stood behind it. You can shake your head all you want. But I've got a picture I'll show everybody in here. You did it.

(Mr. Osborne spoke out from the gallery, again)

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** You did it, you did it, Mr. Osborne. Quiet you've had your time, I did not interrupt you. You did it. Then you moved the camera to the side, then you moved the camera to the side. What that allowed you to do is play victim. Really, all you did, you took liberties that no other responsible citizen would do. And then you backed off and you cried victim. We're used to it by now. But as it pertains to the camera, and I emailed Mr. Saylor earlier today, I've reached out to the director of media at Hoover High School. Who, in the interest of full disclosure is my brother-in-law. So he's doing me a favor in regards to this. And I'm going to ask him about placing a camera in here somewhere. A fixed camera that we can tie into audio and he seems to think that we will have the ability to live stream this. Meaning you can sit at home and watch it and hear it. Now, what I also want to look at is the possibility of archiving this and I think, he seems to think we can have it archived for free as well. The live streaming would be free as well. I don't know if it's going to on a YouTube channel. He mentioned something about a certain government channel that would be specific to this. He's, we're still in I had the discussion with him today, we're still in the discussion process. But he's reaching out to the director of media over at GlenOak High School as well. And he's got some contacts throughout, he can do the work, but I ask that he not consider that, because he is my brother-in-law and I just don't want any conflict. Possible conflict there. But he said he will give us some names and address of folks that will do this. And I want to look at the cost. I want to look at the cost is, live streaming isn't a problem. But it's the archiving and how we tie that in with the audio. Those questions are going to be asked and I want to put a cost to that. But I think the biggest cost is going to be the camera and where we place it and the type of pixels. I want a decent picture, I don't want a grainy picture.

(Mr. Osborne spoke out from the gallery, again)

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Mr. Osborne, are you kidding me? I didn't interrupt you once. And you just feel, you feel it's your right to stand out there and interrupt me and say whatever you want from the audience. And you do it every week. And you think it's your right. You have more right than Ms. Baughman here. She cares just as much about this community as you do and takes us to task as much. She never interrupts, ever. So anyways, that's where we're at with the cameras. You know as I get more information and if there's any information and I will be gracious enough to say this, if there's any information that you could bring us, anybody that would be helpful in this endeavor. Let's do it, let's open it up, you know, I'm tired of being portrayed as a closed secretive politician. It's not the case. You know it's not the case, it doesn't fit your narrative that you want to put out there at times. But you know in your heart of hearts it's not the case. So with that being said. Mr. Saylor, you're up.

**GLEN SAYLOR:** 340 Reed Avenue, North Canton. I thank council for allowing me to speak tonight. Couple of things before my main point. First, I did want to thank Chuck Osborne for taping the council sessions. Those are on YouTube, the easiest way to find him is you go to the YouTube to the search window up at the top of the screen just type in Chuck Osborne, and you'll find those videos. The January 12<sup>th</sup> video that he posted has over 120 views. This is as of this morning. The one from January 25<sup>th</sup> which he just posted a couple of days ago has 51 views. Regardless whether you're at council meetings or not I think it gives you good perspective to go back and see those videos. So I urge everybody to do that. I thought it would be interesting compare that to the number of people who view the council minutes on the city's website. Well that's pretty easy to do because the number of people that viewed the minutes on the council website was exactly zero. And how do I know that, because no minutes have been posted on the county website for council meetings since the December 7<sup>th</sup> meeting. So there's been four council meetings since then, none of them are posted on the website. Which I think is inexcusable. They should be updated so that people can go out there and read those minutes as soon as their available or within a couple of days. Normally most and I work with governmental entities, county governments, they update their websites every night. So I don't see why we can't as well. I was going to thank Mr. Foltz, I'll still thank him even he's not here for voicing his concerns about the changing of the council meeting schedule last week. But my main comments were in regards to water quality issues. I know everybody's heard about Flint, Michigan and even closer to home Sebring, Ohio. And North Canton, ourselves had water quality issues not that many years ago. So I was wondering if the Mayor thought it was a good idea maybe to have some kind of city hall or I'm sorry a town hall meeting possibly at the civic center about water supply. I think if we had administration, some water department personnel possibly, EPA, representatives from labs that test our water. I know we get this report every year and I think it's a good report. But if on our website we could maybe put a link on the home page to this. Because water quality is so important. You have to go through several stages to get to this report. And it's also called a consumer confidence report; which is kind of nice name but I think drinking water quality that's the way the report used to be called. And it's more representative of what it is. So if we could have a link on the homepage I think that would be great. And also if we could get public input before the meeting as to different things that might be good to cover at the meeting. And I'm just going to bring up a couple right now. We had that big fire out at Tristan Rubber, which is quite close to the Dressler Road site of the well out there. You know, what have we been doing there as far as making sure that either runoff from the when the water was sprayed on the fire that, you know, chemicals within the building itself didn't possibly contaminate or possibly

contaminate the water supply or even chemicals that the fire department might have used that might do that. Also if you look at the 2014 report there's different things in there like testing of radioactive substances. In 2014, it says that it wasn't required so there wasn't anything done. Some of the radioactive substances haven't been tested going way back to 2010. I don't know anything about water quality or how you do testing or whatever like that. But I think maybe we would want to look at possibly doing testing on those types of things every year. I don't know, then in regards to lead, we've got 30 samples that we're taking. So maybe at that meeting you could show a map of exactly where those samples are being taken from and then possibly a discussion of maybe increasing the number of sample sites, because that seems to be a big problem right now is lead. In water supplies. So I appreciate you letting me take a couple extra seconds there. But you know I think maybe a timeframe of maybe 90 days. I don't know when the next report's coming out for 2015, if we could maybe you know if that's close to when this report is coming out maybe in conjunction with that. But I think it would be a great service to the community because a lot of these figures; it's kind of like those financial reports. If you look at a company they have yearly reports and that's fine and good, but it's more for an accountant, you know, they understand all those numbers and figures. I think the average citizens if we had a town hall meeting we could get a lot of benefit from that. So I would appreciate any consideration in that regards. Thank you.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thanks. Okay, is there anyone else wishing to address council please step forward and state your name and address.

**LARRY TRIPP:** 1127 East Maple, North Canton. First of all, a very nice article in Sunday's Repository and they're both are on the website now. Regarding the Hoover District and very favorable article on Mayor Held. Both caught my attention. However, in saying that, this, the climate within these chamber walls is one of animosity and mistrust to those of us who come to the meetings on a regular or occasional basis. How did this happen? In my opinion, the foundation was laid out when the plan was presented to hire our current law director and his subsequent manipulation of you, yes, you City Council members. It only intensified with the election by you of our current council president. How is it that two members of this council have again placed in the list of top worst elected officials in Stark County, by the Stark County Political Report? How is it that this publication continuously sees you as the worst city council in Stark County? How is it the Canton Repository prints an editorial for changed legislation that should never reached council chambers? How is it that our council president responds to bold publications and if I may read one sentence from his response to the Repository. "Once again, Mr. Osborne is taking liberties that no other responsibly citizen would even think of and then cower, cower away all the while to be a victim of North Canton officials." Councilman Peters, do any way imply that a North Canton citizen is perhaps the most nasty and unprofessional remark to come from a North Canton elected official. How is it this same council president responds to a blog by the SCPR and posts a picture of a North Canton citizen standing by video equipment without saying it was taken during the council business portion of the meeting. For all we know that picture could have been staged any time. So once again, what has happened within these chamber walls? Where leaders, real leaders of this fine community once sat. These are questions with each as members of this City Council must address individually, collectively or chaos will continue to flourish within these council meetings. Last week, I was approached by Councilman Cerreta and as I recall him saying I was an individual who comes to all the meeting complains but never has a solution. That changes tonight. That changes tonight. I will, which in my opinion present two problems facing council along with solutions. Problem one, culture of current law director during council meetings an inability or unwillingness of council president to control this. Solution, immediately reign in actions of law director by whatever measures you see feasible and ask for resignation of council president. Then replace him with Councilman Foltz. Problem two, council hearing of legislation pertaining to meeting time, place and recording. Solution, table and immediately get rid of this legislation as it has no value or betterment to the citizens of this community. Adopt the solution offered by a North Canton citizen Mr. Saylor and suggested by Councilman Fonte as one having merit. In closing, Councilman Cerreta I can take criticism but I didn't know it was the responsibility of public speakers to offer a solution each and every time they speak. I find this, excuse me, I'm getting dry, as a slap in the face when you ask me to do the job for which you were elected. I ask you, is speaking for the safety of our citizens complaining? Is speaking one time, which I did in 2015 too often? If others on council share this mentality we are in for another long two years. Finally, I would like to end with words from a serenity prayer that may be applicable to North Canton Council.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thank you, Mr. Tripp, your time is up.

**LARRY TRIPP:** I'm going to offer a prayer.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thank you, Mr. Tripp, your time is up.

**LARRY TRIPP:** That shows your true class. God grant me the serenity...

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Mr. Tripp, your time is up, please sit down. Mr. Tripp, please sit down, you've had your 5 minutes.

**LARRY TRIPP:** He went 6.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Mr. Tripp.

**LARRY TRIPP:** He went 6.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Mr. Tripp, I will have you removed.

**LARRY TRIPP:** I will remove myself.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Why don't you do that?

**LARRY TRIPP:** You're a joke.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thank you, sir

**LARRY TRIPP:** You've been a joke.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thank you. Oh boy where do I start?

**COUNCILWOMAN WERREN:** Let's move on, Jeff, let's move on.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Alright, if there's anyone else wishing to address council please step forward and state your name and address.

**MIRIAM BAUGHMAN:** 320 Weber. I think it's a wonderful idea to live stream the meeting. I watch my granddaughter's basketball games on my computer. Live stream when they go to Indiana, to Michigan. There I sit in my living room and she's what 500 miles away and I can still see the games. And of course, she's with the Ashland women's basketball team. They are currently 21 and 0. They are ranked the NCAA national ranking #3 in Division II. And we have two North Canton girls that play.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Outstanding.

**COUNCILMAN CERRETA:** What college was that again?

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Ashland.

**MIRIAM BAUGHMAN:** Ashland. Okay, my first hand out is from the front of the charter, it's our what our city is set up. And you will see that the director of law and the clerk of council both report to and receive direction from the council, through the council president. That's important to remember. Okay, the next page is Ordinance No. 33 – 2013, May 28<sup>th</sup>, 2013, when this ordinance was passed every person sitting there was around. Okay, 111.05 Committee of the Whole meeting agenda. The clerk by 4:00pm on Tuesday any agendas shall be reported to the clerk by 4:00pm on the Tuesday before the meeting. The president of council may make exceptions. Last week I sat in here and heard that the former clerk at 10 after 12 refused to take any agenda changes. That was incorrect. First of all, 4:00 and the clerk does not have the authority to disapprove. The clerk has to forward it to the president of council, he/she makes that decision. So that was very incorrect information.

**COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING:** No, it was accurate. She did that. But I see what you're saying.

**MIRIAM BAUGHMAN:** Okay. Alright, and then we go to down to #2 and it said "that the agendas will be available to council by 12:00 noon on Thursday. Not 4:00pm, the general public I can get it at 4:00 on Friday, but council by ordinance on Thursday afternoon. So if you're not getting it then they're not in compliance with the ordinance. 111.06, that was Committee of the Whole, 111.06 talks to the Council Meeting agenda, go down to 1 and 2 and it's the same. Okay, I just wanted, I did some fact checking. I'm done.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Okay, I'm glad you brought this up. And I actually had it written down, I got a little sidetracked over here for a minute. This is what we're going to back to. When I reference going back to the regular schedule; in order to do the regular schedule first and third, second and fourth; we need to have that, we need to have this guideline.

**MIRIAM BAUGHMAN:** You're not going back to it, it's always been there.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Well, you know what I'm saying.

**MIRIAM BAUGHMAN:** Yeah.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** What we proposed we're not going to do what we proposed, we're going to continue on what we had on the books now.

**MIRIAM BAUGHMAN:** It's on the books.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** With the deadline. We're going to adhere to that deadline. And also in my notes I spoke to the mayor today and he assured me he's going to have the conversation with his department heads and reiterate to them this new schedule. And we're going to hold them to it. There are going to be things that come up and we'll have to take a voice vote and we'll have to have a special meeting.

**MIRIAM BAUGHMAN:** Well, you decide.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Exactly. I will decide.

**MIRIAM BAUGHMAN:** If something comes up then the clerk calls you and tells you what it is and then you decide.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** We want to be responsive, we want to have that flexibility. But at the same time and I think it was Melanie that brought it up you want to have that continuity so folks that want to come up, what that you I spoke to, if someone wants to come up and address council and it's not public speaks night then you know then they get frustrated and walk away. I don't want that to happen. So any Monday they come up they're going to be able to address council before the meeting.

**MIRIAM BAUGHMAN:** That's good, that's good.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** That's what we're trying to do.

**MIRIAM BAUGHMAN:** But things can flow smoothly because you really have things in place.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** I agree.

**MIRIAM BAUGHMAN:** Thank you.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thank you, Miriam. Is there anyone else wishing to address council, please step forward state your name and address. We run out of people? Okay, seeing none we will move onto old business. May I have a motion and a second to read by title only the second reading of Ordinance No. 1 – 2016?

**COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH:** So moved.

**COUNCILMAN CERRETA:** Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to read by title only the first reading of Ordinance No. 1 - 2016.

8. Ordinance No. 1 – 2016 Street and Alley Committee

An ordinance authorizing the Final Resolution enacted by the City of North Canton, Ohio, hereinafter referred to as the Legislative Authority/Local Public Agency or "LPA", in the matter of the state described project, and declaring the same to be an emergency.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thank you, Chairman Fonte.

**COUNCILMAN FONTE:** Okay, this is the ordinance in regards to the widening of State Route 43, from 4 to 5 lanes there. And it's going to be from 55<sup>th</sup> Street all the way up to Applegrove. And it's a joint project between ODOT, Stark Parks, and us. And we will only be responsible really for our portion of it. But there'll be a lot of exciting things happening here and I move that we put it on for emergency, get it on for emergency.

**COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING:** Second.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thank you, may I have a motion and a second to suspend the rules of council for three readings for Ordinance No. 1 – 2016.

**COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING:** So moved.

**COUNCILMAN CERRETA:** Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to suspend the rules of council for three readings for Ordinance No. 1 – 2016.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thank you, may I have a motion and a second to adopt under suspension of the rules for Ordinance No. 1 – 2016?

**COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING:** So moved.

**COUNCILMAN CERRETA:** Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to adopt under suspension of the rules for Ordinance No. 1 – 2016.

ORDINANCE NO. 1 – 2016 WAS PASSED BY A ROLL CALL VOTE OF 6 YES.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thank you. May I have a motion and a second to read by title the second reading of Ordinance

No. 2 – 2016?

**COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH:** So moved.

**COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING:** Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to read by title only the second reading of Ordinance No. 2 - 2016.

9. Ordinance No. 2 – 2016

Finance and Property Committee

An ordinance authorizing the Mayor of the City of North Canton, upon Board of Control approval, and pursuant to Ohio Cooperative Purchase Act, to enter into an agreement with Jack Doheny Companies for the purchase of an Elgin Whirlwind MV Pure Vacuum Street Sweeper, and declaring the same to be an emergency.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thank you, Chairman Griffith.

**COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH:** We had good discussion about this last week. I see Jim's here, I'd invite him, Jim, anything you want to add about the street sweeper here?

**STREET SUPERINTENDENT DAVIS:** Just excited to get a new one.

**COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH:** I did have a question, not to make the meeting any longer. What qualifications do you have to have to drive the street sweeper? Is there, do you have to have like your CDL or something.

**STREET SUPERINTENDENT DAVIS:** No, there's special qualifications for that.

**COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH:** So any random like city councilmember could drive it?

**STREET SUPERINTENDENT DAVIS:** Come on down.

**COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH:** Are there other questions? Last week, we did recognize Jim the fact that you and your team has worked really hard to keep the old one in place as long as you possibly could. And I wanted to say that with you here. Appreciate your efforts to do that and of course, we're about to get this new one and hope that you will nurse it along as long as you can. So without any other questions I will move its approval.

**COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING:** Second.

ORDINANCE NO. 2 – 2016 WAS PASSED BY A ROLL CALL VOTE OF 6 YES.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thank you. May I have a motion and a second to read by title the second reading of Ordinance No. 3 – 2016?

**COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH:** So moved.

**COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING:** Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to read by title only the second reading of Ordinance No. 3 - 2016.

10. Ordinance No. 3 – 2016

Finance and Property Committee

An ordinance providing for the issuance and sale of bonds in the maximum principal amount of \$5,300,000 for the purpose of refunding at a lower cost certain of the City's outstanding (I) Water System Improvement Bonds, Series 2007 dated February 14, 2007, and (II) Various Purpose Bonds, Series 2011A dated March 23, 2011, and declaring the same to be an emergency.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thank you, Chairman Griffith.

**COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH:** I hope the demonstration that we had, the discussion we had earlier was illustrative. I assure you that the discussion we've had have been much more thorough than what we talked about tonight. And again, if you have any questions or issues obviously I'm sure Karen's happy to answer some of them. I'm happy to answer those too. But as you can see there really is very little downside if any at all for us doing this. So I would say, again, it doesn't extend any debt for the city, it allows us to save a lot of money on annualize basis. And it allows us to retire that debt on the exact same schedule that we did before. So, are there any other questions relative to the bonds? Alright, seeing none I will move its approval.

**COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING:** Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to adopt the second reading of Ordinance No. 3 – 2016.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETERS:** Thank you, may I have a motion and a second to suspend the rules of council for three readings for Ordinance No. 3 – 2016?

**COUNCILMAN GRIFFITH:** So moved.

**COUNCILWOMAN KIESLING:** Second.

Roll call vote of 6 yes to adopt under suspension of the rules for Ordinance No. 3 – 2016.

ORDINANCE NO. 3 – 2016 WAS PASSED BY A ROLL CALL VOTE OF 6 YES.




