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1 MR. YOUNG: We are live.

2 MR. STROIA: I now call to order the City  
3 Council meeting for June 13th, 2022. The  
4 time is 7:00 p.m.

5 Opening prayer. Jamie.

6 (Whereupon, Mr. McCleaster leads us in  
7 prayer.)

8 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance is  
9 recited.)

10 MR. STROIA: All right. Ben, would you  
11 please call the roll?

12 MR. YOUNG: Member Orr.

13 MR. ORR: Here.

14 MR. YOUNG: Member Metheney.

15 MR. METHENEY: Here.

16 MR. YOUNG: Member Stroia.

17 MR. STROIA: Here.

18 MR. YOUNG: Member Werren.

19 MS. WERREN: Here.

20 MR. YOUNG: Member Weyrick.

21 MS. WEYRICK: Here.

22 MR. YOUNG: Member McCleaster.

23 MR. MCCLEASTER: Here.

24 MR. YOUNG: Member Revoldt.

25 MR. REVOLDT: Here.

1 MR. YOUNG: Seven present.

2 MR. STROIA: Okay. Can I have a motion  
3 and a second to approve as presented minutes  
4 from -- we are going to table minutes from  
5 May 16th. But we will motion and approve May  
6 23rd public hearing, May 23rd City Council  
7 meeting, and the May 23rd monthly finance  
8 report.

9 MR. METHENEY: I make a motion that we  
10 pass those three listed.

11 MR. MCCLEASTER: Second.

12 MR. STROIA: All in favor?

13 MR. ORR: Aye.

14 MR. STROIA: Aye.

15 MR. METHENEY: Aye.

16 MS. WERREN: Aye.

17 MS. WEYRICK: Aye.

18 MR. MCCLEASTER: Aye.

19 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

20 MR. STROIA: Opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 MR. STROIA: Motion carries.

23 MR. METHENEY: Do we need a motion to  
24 table?

25 MR. STROIA: Yes.

1 MR. METHENEY: I make a motion that we  
2 table the minutes from May 16th, pending a  
3 correction.

4 MR. MCCLEASTER: Second.

5 MR. STROIA: All in favor?

6 MR. ORR: Aye.

7 MR. STROIA: Aye.

8 MR. METHENEY: Aye.

9 MS. WERREN: Aye.

10 MS. WEYRICK: Aye.

11 MR. MCCLEASTER: Aye.

12 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

13 MR. STROIA: Opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 MR. STROIA: Motion carries.

16 Moving on to recognition of public, at  
17 this time, we'll begin recognition of public.  
18 Each individual will have five minutes to  
19 speak. The time and the rules will be  
20 displayed to the screen on the audience's  
21 left. When it's your turn to speak, please  
22 come to the podium and start by stating your  
23 name and address for the record.

24 MR. YOUNG: Right, the audience's right.

25 MR. STROIA: Right. Did I say left?

1 MR. YOUNG: Yes.

2 MR. SWING: Good evening. I am Attorney  
3 Christopher Swing with the law firm of Brouse  
4 McDowell. I'm here this evening on behalf of  
5 Albrecht, Incorporated and Acme Fresh Market  
6 stores, 1474 North Main Street.

7 I'm here this evening to provide public  
8 comment on agenda item 7A. That's an  
9 ordinance purporting to amend Chapter 1136,  
10 specifically to add gasoline stations as an  
11 accessory use, requiring a conditional use  
12 permit in the Main Street North Gateway  
13 District.

14 As this City Council is well aware, the  
15 zoning code was overhauled and amended  
16 effective 2021. At that time, the City did  
17 not see fit to allow gas stations in the Main  
18 Street corridor. There are five primary  
19 districts. It is not only a -- not only is  
20 it not a conditionally permitted use, it is  
21 not permitted whatsoever as it stands  
22 currently, Main Street Center, Main Street  
23 North, Main Street South, Main Street North  
24 Gateway, Main Street South Gateway.

25 In regard to the proposed legislation,

1           there are issues in terms of whether or not  
2           it has even fulfilled the submission  
3           requirements. I have not seen a statement of  
4           the reasons for the proposed amendment. I  
5           have not seen a statement of the ways in  
6           which this proposed amendment relates to the  
7           City's master plan. And that's because it  
8           doesn't.

9           This is a textbook example of spot zoning  
10          for a contemplated singular use developer  
11          that's coming in behind it. And we know that  
12          that's Meijer. And that's for development  
13          about which the public hasn't even seen a  
14          purchase agreement, or at least a signed  
15          purchase agreement, but yet they want -- they  
16          are asking you to amend the zoning code,  
17          something that was thought through, something  
18          for which money was spent. There were  
19          significant investments, time, thought, and  
20          resources to develop that plan.

21          And the gas station doesn't comply with  
22          the spirit and intent of that newly-enacted  
23          zoning code. In fact, those districts were  
24          established to promote the development of a  
25          higher density, more consistent, walkable,

1 urban fabric, and attract increased  
2 investment in commercial corridors and nodes.  
3 A gas station fails to do that, as does a  
4 Meijer big box development.

5 Moreover, a gas station doesn't advance  
6 any of the following under 1136 of your  
7 zoning code: It doesn't advance a mixture of  
8 storefront retail, professional offices, and  
9 dwelling units. It doesn't advance buildings  
10 with active building facade set at or close  
11 to the sidewalk. It doesn't advance  
12 pedestrian-oriented scale development with  
13 sidewalks. It does none of those things.

14 And, in fact, it's not really an  
15 accessory use at all. And if you just look  
16 at the definition of accessory use in your  
17 own zoning code -- and just because you pass  
18 legislation, that doesn't make it so. If you  
19 look at 1125.02(B)(11), it defines, A,  
20 building accessory, subordinate building  
21 detached from but located on the same lot as  
22 the principal building, the use of which is  
23 incidental and accessory to the principal  
24 use.

25 A gas station is not incidental to the

1 operation of a Meijer large box discount  
2 grocery store and hard sales.

3 If you look at -- further at  
4 1125.02(B)(115), accessory use means a use of  
5 land incidental to the principal use of a lot  
6 or building located on the same lot. This  
7 proposed gas station is not ancillary to,  
8 it's not incidental to. In fact, Merriam-  
9 Webster defines "incidental" as being  
10 occurring merely by chance or without  
11 intention or calculation.

12 This is purely intended. This is purely  
13 calculated. This is not an incidental use.  
14 And, in fact, my suspicion is that Meijer  
15 won't do this deal without the gas station.  
16 So it runs clearly afoul of that expressed  
17 provision in the code.

18 Now, you have already heard from Joe  
19 Albrecht with Albrecht, Incorporated, the  
20 land owner. You have heard from his brother,  
21 Nick Albrecht. You have heard about their  
22 concerns about it cannibalizing existing  
23 business. We are asking you to slow down.  
24 We are asking you to retain an independent  
25 third party, neutral, to evaluate the

1 economic impact on existing businesses as it  
2 stands.

3 What you are about to do is to set a very  
4 dangerous precedent with spot zoning. You  
5 are effectively establishing patch work  
6 zoning here in the City of North Canton,  
7 after you just spent all this money, time,  
8 and investment to research and to put  
9 together a master plan.

10 You can't make up the rules as you go  
11 along. You can't do indirectly what you are  
12 not allowed to do directly. And you are  
13 certainly not and shouldn't do it for the  
14 sake of political expediency. And for those  
15 reasons, I respectfully submit that if and  
16 when this comes before Council for a vote,  
17 that you reject the amendment. Thank you.

18 MR. STROIA: Thank you.

19 Anyone else wishing to address Council  
20 tonight?

21 MR. TRIPP: Larry Tripp, 1127 East Maple,  
22 North Canton. I believe that the DORA as now  
23 working in North Canton is not benefiting the  
24 City one iota. I believe it's opening itself  
25 for ordinance violations, and it's just not

1           doing the City what has been told to you  
2           folks before.

3                       So let's start tonight. Let's start with  
4           DORA cup sales to participants holding  
5           permits with the ordinance -- where the --  
6           which the ordinance states must be sold in  
7           lots of 500 or more cups. I found one  
8           violation with one participant purchasing 250  
9           cups, not meeting the 500 requirement.

10                      An explanation -- an explanation on this  
11           transaction was given to me by Council Clerk  
12           Ben Young. While his remarks were  
13           appreciated, the fact remains that this was a  
14           clear violation of the ordinance. Rules,  
15           like he said, can't be made up as they go  
16           along.

17                      Two, Ordinance 28-2021, change the DORA  
18           boundaries, which in my opinion are not being  
19           followed for events such as the 720. I don't  
20           believe the parking lots behind the buildings  
21           on Main and West Maple are included in the  
22           DORA boundaries. In fact, check the DORA  
23           containers on West Maple, and notice where  
24           the -- where they are located.

25                      Three, some sales of 500 cups to St. Paul

1 Church. Why? To me, this may be an  
2 indication they have been using the DORA  
3 concept in their church area, not designated  
4 in the DORA boundaries. .

5 Four, all special events on Main Street  
6 generally start at 10:00 a.m. Ordinance  
7 28-21 -- 28-2021 changed DORA's times to  
8 12:00 p.m. to -- from 12:00 p.m. to 11:00  
9 p.m. There may be an out for the Mayor to  
10 change times and dates, but the ordinance is  
11 very confusing. And I do see the possibility  
12 of violations in the ordinance.

13 Five, I believe a change should be made  
14 to Ordinance 28-2021 in section 5, where it  
15 reads the resolution shall take effect, not  
16 the ordinance should take effect. An auditor  
17 may find this ordinance was never approved.

18 Six, on April 4th, Council Member  
19 Revoldt, assisted by Council Clerk, presented  
20 an evaluation report for the four  
21 participating holders, two permanent and two  
22 temporary. He stated their records indicated  
23 the City sold 10,450 cups to permit holders,  
24 which equated to a conservative estimate of  
25 over \$52,000 in additional commercial

1 activity for these businesses. It appears  
2 these figures are predicated on the sale of  
3 each and every cup as -- of these cups at \$5  
4 a cup a beverage.

5 Simple math, 5 times 10,450 equals  
6 \$52,250. I have reason to believe these  
7 figures are highly inflated. Records I have  
8 received from City personnel indicate the  
9 City has sold 8,750 cups to its participants,  
10 or a difference of 1,700 cups.

11 Records show 1,000 DORA cups sold to  
12 Howlin Bird, 500 cups to Pav's, 500 DORA cups  
13 to Saint Paul's. 1,750 DORA cups sold to  
14 Chamber of Commerce, with an additional  
15 500 -- 5,000 new clear plastic cups with a  
16 DORA label pasted on them. This should equal  
17 8,750 cups. So I would expect the commerce  
18 activity to be much less, since none of the  
19 participants have made any purchase as of  
20 last Friday.

21 This tells me each participant has some  
22 carryover for 2022. How -- how many is  
23 anybody's guess. Pav's did advise they had  
24 250 or 50 percent of their inventory on hand.

25 So are my comments tonight earthshaking?

1           Probably not. However, Council Member Orr,  
2           who initiated the new DORA legislation, and  
3           Council Members Stroia and McCleaster --

4           MR. STROIA: Wrap it up. We are over  
5           five.

6           MR. TRIPP: About two seconds -- last  
7           week stated this is a successful program. I  
8           contradict that. I have made a presentation  
9           tonight that contains information worthy of  
10          discussion to table this ordinance for  
11          further review. Thanks, Mr. Stroia.

12          MR. STROIA: Thank you.

13          MR. MCCLEASTER: Thanks, Larry.

14          MS. PLATT: Sue Platt, 801 Briar. I have  
15          a suggestion regarding the Charter changes  
16          that will be on the November ballot. To be  
17          an informed voter, voters want and need to  
18          know the original language before voting on  
19          the proposed changes.

20                 I know when voting on the last changes,  
21                 people would ask me, what does the Charter  
22                 say now. I had to say, I don't know. This  
23                 information should be disseminated to the  
24                 public both electronically and in print. It  
25                 might help clarify the ballot language, and

1 definitely would be good communication with  
2 the constituents.

3 And just for example, I'm looking at 8D,  
4 where it says for the purpose of simplifying  
5 the notice requirements. What does that  
6 mean? What was it before? What do they want  
7 now? Just so people know what they are  
8 voting on. And I know ballot language, you  
9 can't put everything on the ballot. It will  
10 be a small part of it. But I do think this  
11 information should be available to the  
12 public. That's all. And I can't stay for  
13 the rest of the meeting, but I will be  
14 anxious to listen to your comments.

15 MR. STROIA: Thank you so much.

16 MR. ORR: Thank you.

17 MS. WEYRICK: Thank you, Sue.

18 MR. STROIA: Anyone else wishing to  
19 address Council tonight?

20 MR. OSBORNE: I don't see no microphone.  
21 Do I --

22 MR. STROIA: It's -- it will be picked up  
23 up here.

24 MR. OSBORNE: Okay. My comments are in  
25 regards to certain proposed Charter

1 amendments that will -- I guess I ought to  
2 give my name and address. Chuck Osborne, 307  
3 Fairview Street, Southeast, North Canton,  
4 Ohio.

5 My comments are in regards to certain  
6 proposed Charter amendments that are to have  
7 their first reading tonight. It was obvious  
8 to me after observing Council discussions and  
9 reading a portion of the meeting minutes of  
10 the Charter Advisory Board, referred to as a  
11 hybrid, that many of those who participated  
12 had little to no understanding of the  
13 workings of our City government.

14 For me, the sole purpose of this current  
15 effort is to double the terms of North Canton  
16 elected officials from two years to four  
17 years. All other proposed amendments are  
18 distractions from this main goal.

19 This same tactic was used five years ago  
20 during the decennial Charter review process  
21 in 2017. The holy grail that year was to  
22 remove the Charter requirement that a member  
23 of Council attend meetings of the City's  
24 Planning Commission and City's ZBA meetings.  
25 At that time, Marcia Kisling was required by

1 City Charter to attend Planning meetings and  
2 Stephanie Werren was to attend ZBA meetings.  
3 For several years, neither complied with the  
4 City's Charter to attend such meetings, and  
5 years of truancy by Mrs. Kisling and  
6 Mrs. Werren were ignored by City Council.

7 At last week's Council meeting, a member  
8 of Council asked how appointees are chosen  
9 for the commission, but did not get an  
10 answer. Let me tell you, Charter Review  
11 Commission members are appointed by Council,  
12 two by each member and three by the Council  
13 President. This comprises the total 15  
14 members of a Charter Review Commission.

15 Five years ago, Mrs. Werren and Mrs.  
16 Kisling, between them, appointed four members  
17 of the 2017 commission. The appointees of  
18 these two always-absent members at Planning  
19 and ZBA meetings were able to then lobby for  
20 the commission's recommendation to remove  
21 that requirement in the City's Charter.

22 The first time this change had been  
23 presented for discussion in 2017, the  
24 commission declined. At a subsequent  
25 meeting, weeks later, the proposed change to

1           remove the attendance requirement was  
2           presented a second time and agreed to by the  
3           entire commission. Political loyalty among  
4           members of Council resulted in Council  
5           placing that question before voters.

6           Currently North Canton's Charter  
7           specifies that the makeup of the commission  
8           not include individuals who hold municipal or  
9           appointive office. Yet in violation of the  
10          Charter, the five members comprising  
11          membership of this year's hybrid Charter  
12          Advisory Board included the City's Finance  
13          Director and the City's Council Clerk, who  
14          chaired the meeting.

15          Does changing the name of this body from  
16          Charter Review Commission to Charter Advisory  
17          Board automatically undue this Charter  
18          requirement? In evaluating the proposed  
19          Charter amendments, each and every member of  
20          Council should be able to explain the reasons  
21          for any changes and the benefits of those  
22          changes for citizens. I heard no logical  
23          reason supporting many of the proposed  
24          changes to the City's Charter.

25                 In the February 14th, 2022 Charter

1           Advisory Board meeting minutes, Council Clerk  
2           Young begins with the first proposed Charter  
3           change; that is, no -- no -- that is altering  
4           the terms of office for elected officials  
5           from a two-year to four-year staggered term.  
6           I quote, this is one of the ones I collected  
7           beforehand, and it was also submitted by a  
8           member of the public during our public  
9           submission phase. I received this suggestion  
10          from a number of different elected and public  
11          officials, and the idea is that elected  
12          officials will stay around longer, closed  
13          quotes.

14                 I can understand that officeholders want  
15                 longer terms. It benefits them and them  
16                 alone. But do longer terms benefit City  
17                 residents? I think not. Currently the  
18                 City's Charter specifies a two-year residency  
19                 requirement before a citizen can run for  
20                 elective office. Given that requirement,  
21                 under two-year terms of office, which North  
22                 Canton has had since the adoption of the  
23                 Charter in 1961, residents could find  
24                 themselves having to live in the City for  
25                 four years before they could run for elective

1 office. Under the proposed change to a  
2 four-year term of office, new City residents  
3 could find themselves having to live in the  
4 City for as long as six years before they can  
5 run for office.

6 How is this change beneficial for the  
7 citizens of North Canton? Congressional  
8 representatives hold two-year terms and have  
9 been doing so for over 200 years.

10 Running for election allows candidates to  
11 learn more about their community, as well as  
12 get to know City residents in the course of a  
13 campaign. It allows residents to participate  
14 in what we all treasure as the democratic  
15 process of our government.

16 Four years is a long time. I would  
17 foresee officeholders resigning during such  
18 long terms. At that point, remaining members  
19 of Council will appoint a replacement,  
20 leaving citizens out of choosing their  
21 representatives. That Council-appointed  
22 replacement could then run as incumbent,  
23 thereby edging out a citizen who had waited  
24 six years to run for that very office.

25 A four-year term for mayor would work.

1 But let's maintain two-year terms for all  
2 seven seats on City Council so as not to  
3 diminish all hopes of newer citizens that  
4 they could run for a seat on City Council  
5 without waiting as long as six years. Thank  
6 you.

7 MR. ORR: Thank you, Chuck.

8 MR. STROIA: Anyone else wishing to  
9 address Council tonight?

10 MS. MIZNER: Hi. I'm not sure if you  
11 guys remember me. Teresa Mizner, 604  
12 Hillcrest Avenue, Northwest. I am the one  
13 that, with many others, had severe damage  
14 from the flooding. I am basically here  
15 letting you guys all know I'm not going  
16 anywhere. Because, obviously, mother nature  
17 will never go anywhere.

18 I have had this major problem two times  
19 now, eleven years apart. I know it's going  
20 to happen again. I don't know if you guys  
21 quite remember, about a week later there was  
22 a downpour. I stood staring out my front  
23 door, nervous, nervous. Luckily it just came  
24 to about the sidewalk. But literally -- I  
25 have each and every one of your cards. I was

1 about ready to call you and tell you to come  
2 on over and watch the show. Because it is  
3 crazy.

4 So I am starting to get bills. I only  
5 got a couple, but I have many coming in,  
6 which I will be sure to be making copies for  
7 each and every one of you, because I need  
8 serious help.

9 So basically I'm going to stick around to  
10 maybe talk to Jamie --

11 MR. MCCLEASTER: Absolutely.

12 MS. MIZNER: -- see if there is anything  
13 that you guys are trying to figure out, look  
14 into. If not, I'm going to bug you until you  
15 do. Because this is a major, serious  
16 problem. And I can't live this way. It's  
17 not right. It's not -- it's just not right  
18 for my husband and I to have to do this, and  
19 my neighbors.

20 So I just wanted to let you know, I'm  
21 here again. Thanks.

22 MR. METHENEY: Thanks.

23 MR. STROIA: Anyone else wanting to  
24 address Council tonight?

25 (No response.)

1 MR. STROIA: Okay. Moving on to old  
2 business, can I have a motion and a second to  
3 read by title only Ordinance 24-2022?

4 MR. MCCLEASTER: So moved.

5 MR. METHENEY: Second.

6 MR. STROIA: All in favor?

7 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

8 MR. STROIA: Aye.

9 MR. ORR: Aye.

10 MR. METHENEY: Aye.

11 MS. WERREN: Aye.

12 MS. WEYRICK: Aye.

13 MR. MCCLEASTER: Aye.

14 MR. STROIA: Opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 MR. STROIA: Motion carries.

17 Ben.

18 MR. YOUNG: An ordinance amending Chapter  
19 1136, Main Street District's regulations, of  
20 the codified ordinances of the City of North  
21 Canton, specifically accessory uses as listed  
22 in Section 1136.05, in order to add thereto  
23 gasoline station as an accessory use  
24 requiring a conditional use permit in the  
25 Main Street North Gateway District.

1 MR. STROIA: Okay. Daryl.

2 Is Daryl on mute?

3 MR. REVOLDT: Can you hear me now, Matt?

4 MR. STROIA: Yep, I hear you. Yep.

5 MR. REVOLDT: There we go. Very good.

6 Thank you very much. This is the second  
7 reading. I appreciate Mr. Swing's comments  
8 this evening. I thought his argument was  
9 rather artful. But let's be perfectly clear  
10 what the purpose of Mr. Swing's presence  
11 tonight is, and that is, as he indicated in  
12 his own words, is to kill the Meijer project.  
13 I dispute his assertions, and I think there  
14 are others, including our legal counsel,  
15 which would also disagree with his  
16 representations.

17 So it is -- if there is anyone else on  
18 Council that wishes to add something, I think  
19 this would be an appropriate time. I look to  
20 my left. I look to my right. Matt, I think  
21 you'll have to recognize someone if there are  
22 individuals who wish to speak.

23 MR. STROIA: Anyone else wanting to  
24 comment?

25 MR. MCCLEASTER: No.

1 MR. REVOLDT: All right. So there has  
2 been a motion to read. I'll make a motion to  
3 adopt this -- this second reading.

4 MR. MCCLEASTER: Second.

5 MR. STROIA: All in favor?

6 MR. ORR: Aye.

7 MR. STROIA: Aye.

8 MR. METHENEY: Aye.

9 MS. WERREN: Aye.

10 MS. WEYRICK: Aye.

11 MR. MCCLEASTER: Aye.

12 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

13 MR. STROIA: Opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 MR. STROIA: Motion carries.

16 Moving on to 7B, can I have a motion and  
17 a second to read by title only Ordinance  
18 31-2022?

19 MR. METHENEY: So moved.

20 MS. WEYRICK: Second.

21 MR. STROIA: All in favor?

22 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

23 MR. STROIA: Aye.

24 MR. ORR: Aye.

25 MR. METHENEY: Aye.

1 MS. WERREN: Aye.

2 MS. WEYRICK: Aye.

3 MR. MCCLEASTER: Aye.

4 MR. STROIA: Opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 MR. STROIA: Motion carries.

7 Ben.

8 MR. YOUNG: An ordinance amending the  
9 zoning map of the City of North Canton to  
10 reclassify 2,850 parcels in the City of North  
11 Canton, in accordance with the amendment  
12 procedure set forth in Chapter 1182 of the  
13 planning and zoning code in order to add to  
14 the zoning classification thereof Source  
15 Water Protection Zoning Overlay Districts in  
16 order to protect the drinking water resources  
17 of the City of North Canton, Ohio.

18 MR. STROIA: Water, sewer, and rubbish.  
19 Jamie.

20 MR. MCCLEASTER: All right. Thank you.  
21 This is also up for its second reading. We  
22 have discussed this multiple times, as we  
23 brought it to us, as we got the zoning map  
24 back from the Planning Commission, and this  
25 would be adopting the map. So at this point,

1 I would move that we approve the second  
2 reading, unless there are any other motions  
3 or comments.

4 MS. WEYRICK: Second.

5 MR. STROIA: All in favor?

6 MR. ORR: Aye.

7 MR. STROIA: Aye.

8 MR. METHENEY: Aye.

9 MS. WERREN: Aye.

10 MS. WEYRICK: Aye.

11 MR. MCCLEASTER: Aye.

12 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

13 MR. STROIA: Opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 MR. STROIA: Motion carries.

16 Moving on to new business, can I have a  
17 motion and a second to read by title only  
18 Ordinance 45-2022?

19 MR. ORR: I'll make a motion.

20 MS. WEYRICK: Second.

21 MR. STROIA: All in favor?

22 MR. ORR: Aye.

23 MR. STROIA: Aye.

24 MR. METHENEY: Aye.

25 MS. WERREN: Aye.

1 MS. WEYRICK: Aye.

2 MR. MCCLEASTER: Aye.

3 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

4 MR. STROIA: Opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 MR. STROIA: Motion carries.

7 Ben.

8 MR. YOUNG: An ordinance amending  
9 Ordinance 55-2020, establishing a Designated  
10 Outdoor Refreshment Area, DORA, in the City  
11 of North Canton, in order to expand the hours  
12 of operation and area thereof.

13 MR. STROIA: Okay. Daryl.

14 MR. REVOLDT: Great. Thank you very  
15 much. As you may recall from our committee  
16 meeting, this particular amendment does two  
17 things. It expands the hours to include  
18 Sundays and Monday, and it also expands the  
19 map to include the parking lot behind Saint  
20 Paul's.

21 MR. ORR: Yeah, Daryl, that would  
22 include -- Daryl, that would include the  
23 hours on Monday and Tuesday. Sunday  
24 is always --

25 MR. REVOLDT: That is correct. Thank

1           you. So the expansion of the hours came at  
2           the request of Councilman Orr. I'm going to  
3           assume that he has received some input from  
4           businesses and members of the community to do  
5           just that. And the record should reflect  
6           that the expansion of the map came at the  
7           request of Saint Paul's and Howlin Bird, who  
8           are in fact members of the community. And  
9           certainly Howlin Bird has benefited from the  
10          DORA legislation.

11                 MR. MCCLEASTER: Daryl, can I add  
12           something?

13                 MR. REVOLDT: Is there anyone else who  
14           wishes to add something? Go ahead.

15                 MR. MCCLEASTER: Yeah, I'd like to add  
16           something. I guess just to -- just so it's  
17           clearly stated, entities that do have events  
18           there prior to these changes -- and I fully  
19           support these changes -- they have been doing  
20           so legally under a temporary permit. So I  
21           just want to make sure that's out there.  
22           It's called an F permit.

23                 MR. REVOLDT: Right.

24                 MR. MCCLEASTER: That -- so I just want  
25           to make sure people understand that it is

1 signed off by the City, the property owner --

2 MR. TRIPP: No.

3 MR. MCCLEASTER: -- and the chief of  
4 police --

5 MR. TRIPP: No.

6 MR. MCCLEASTER: -- so it is legal.

7 MR. TRIPP: No.

8 MR. MCCLEASTER: Yeah, it's legal.

9 And the other thing is, you know, I don't  
10 know if our math is incorrect. But whether  
11 it is or not, I think even 8,000 cups being  
12 sold is a resounding success. I think this  
13 is a great opportunity. It's great for  
14 entities like the Chamber of Commerce, for  
15 the events they have. In fact, I think they  
16 are having a cruise-in or something. I don't  
17 know if it would be --

18 MS. WEYRICK: July 16th.

19 MR. MCCLEASTER: Yeah, for the -- the  
20 Howlin Bird is having that. Of course 720  
21 Market this weekend. So I just want to make  
22 sure that that was brought up, as well,  
23 Daryl.

24 MR. ORR: Do we keep track of the cups  
25 each year, how many, you know, we sold last
