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1 MR. YOUNG: When you are ready, Mr.
2 President.

3 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you, Ben.
4 At this time, I'd like to call to order the
5 North Canton City Council meeting, July 13th,
6 2020. The time is 7:02 p.m.

7 Mark, Dom, would you like to lead us in
8 prayer?

9 MR. CERRETA: Sure would. Sure would.

10 MR. PETERS: All right, Mark.

11 (Whereupon, Mr. Cerreta lead us in
12 prayer.)

13 MR. PETERS: All right. At this time, if
14 you would join me in the Pledge of
15 Allegiance.

16 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was
17 recited.)

18 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you. All
19 right. At this time, Council, for your
20 consideration, I need a motion and a second
21 to approve as presented --

22 MR. YOUNG: Roll call, Mr. President.

23 MR. PETERS: Yep. I'm sorry. I'm
24 getting ahead of myself. Ben, please call
25 the roll.

1 MR. YOUNG: Member Foltz.
2 (No response.)
3 MR. CERRETA: Is he on mute maybe?
4 MR. FOLTZ: Did someone say Foltz? Here.
5 Sorry.
6 MR. YOUNG: President Peters.
7 MR. PETERS: Here.
8 MR. YOUNG: Member Werren.
9 MS. WERREN: Here.
10 MR. PETERS: Member Fonte.
11 MR. FONTE: Here.
12 MR. YOUNG: Member Revoldt.
13 MR. REVOLDT: Here.
14 MR. YOUNG: Member Cerreta.
15 MR. CERRETA: Here.
16 MR. YOUNG: And Member Stroia.
17 MR. STROIA: Here.
18 MR. YOUNG: Seven present.
19 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you, sir.
20 Now for Council's consideration, I need a
21 motion and a second to approve as presented
22 minutes from June 10th, 2020, Special Council
23 meeting; June 10th, 2020, Special Committee
24 of the Whole; June 15th, 2020, Committee of
25 the Whole; June 15, 2020 Special Council

1 meeting; June 22nd, 2020, Council meeting;
2 and June 29th, 2020, Committee of the Whole.

3 MR. FOLTZ: Foltz moves to approve as
4 presented.

5 MR. CERRETA: Cerreta seconds.

6 MR. PETERS: All in favor, say "aye."

7 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.

8 MR. PETERS: Aye.

9 MR. CERRETA: Aye.

10 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

11 MR. FONTE: Aye.

12 MS. WERREN: Aye.

13 MR. STROIA: Aye.

14 MR. PETERS: Opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 MR. PETERS: All right. Motion carries.

17 All right. At this time, we have four --
18 four folks for recognition of visitors. Just
19 a quick reminder, there is a five-minute time
20 limit.

21 And at this time, Ben, I will turn it
22 over to you.

23 MR. YOUNG: All right. Mr. Osborne, are
24 you there?

25 MR. OSBORNE: I am here. Can you hear

1 me?

2 MR. YOUNG: Yes. When you are ready,
3 sir.

4 MR. OSBORNE: Chuck Osborne, 307 Fairview
5 Street, Southeast, North Canton, Ohio. My
6 primary topic is our poor little belabored
7 Bitzer Park. It's a very, very, very small,
8 little park, and it is under attack by our
9 own elected representatives.

10 Years ago, when the veterans memorial was
11 put in there, that really should have been
12 relocated and had its own little set-aside
13 area. It could have been called North Canton
14 Memorial Park. But it wasn't. It was put in
15 there. It was a massive memorial, done very
16 nicely. But it has not been protected and
17 respected. It is being utilized as a stage
18 for anything and everything that wants to be
19 put on at Bitzer Park.

20 I have begged and pleaded for four or
21 five years for some kind of fencing to
22 provide a demarcation of where that memorial
23 resides. It's on concentrated ground. And
24 we have seen nothing to set aside that
25 section of the park as a memorial, to go

1 there and quietly reflect on the sacrifices
2 that men and women have made for this
3 country.

4 We have the lovely Boss memorial --
5 Hoover memorial -- statute there, which,
6 again, takes up some space in the park. I
7 haven't measured. I don't know what
8 acreage-wise remains. It can't be much more
9 than maybe a third of an acre maybe.

10 The park is surrounded with some trees,
11 many majestic, very mature trees, very
12 healthy trees. The remarks that they are
13 undermining a sidewalk are without a basis
14 and fact. The problems are, along with the
15 improvements, when the park -- when the
16 memorial was put in, they duplicated the --
17 the pavers that were put up and down Main
18 Street.

19 And over the last several years, it has
20 been acknowledged that -- that Main Street
21 landscape project really wasn't engineered
22 really correctly. There is nothing to really
23 support the pavers. They are sinking in some
24 places. It has nothing to do with the trees.

25 And speaking of trees, I don't know why

1 the City is not maintaining its trees. I
2 just recently hired Davey Tree to come and --
3 and feed my trees and provide some expertise
4 on maintaining those trees. The City should
5 be doing the same thing. And those trees
6 should be maintained.

7 To proceed with this amphitheater, this
8 stage, whatever you want to call it, and
9 obliterate and leave, I guess, as few as ten
10 trees -- there are many residences throughout
11 the City who have more trees than that in
12 their yard. This amphitheater, stage,
13 whatever you want to call it, could be put
14 down there somewhere in the vicinity of the
15 gazebo, next to the Civic Center, or relocate
16 the Civic Center and put the amphitheater
17 there. You are on a much safer street. The
18 speed limit is 25 miles an hour. There is
19 ample parking with three parking lots within
20 easy walking distance. You would not have to
21 cut down a single tree.

22 What remains of Bitzer Park needs to
23 remain in perpetuity. You are transforming
24 this into a plaza, not a park. We need to
25 maintain the trees, respect the memorial that

1 has been set aside there, and relocate it in
2 a much safer area with more ample parking, so
3 we don't create reasons to shut down Main
4 Street like we have done many, many times,
5 driving traffic through the neighborhoods and
6 creating noise in nearby neighborhoods.

7 So, please, to spend nearly a half a
8 million dollars to have a little platform to
9 have events three or four times a year -- or
10 I don't know whatever you want to dream up
11 there weekly -- that is not the place to put
12 it. Thank you very much.

13 MR. PETERS: Thank you, Mr. Osborne.

14 MR. FONTE: Thank you.

15 MR. YOUNG: All right. Mr. Blubaugh, are
16 you there?

17 MR. BLUBAUGH: Yes, I am.

18 MR. YOUNG: When you are ready.

19 MR. BLUBAUGH: Okay. Hello, everyone.
20 Joseph Blubaugh, 256 Glenwood Street, North
21 Canton. I want to start out mentioning that
22 the petition to save the trees at Bitzer Park
23 now has over 580 signatures. I think we
24 should admit that 580 is a significant
25 number. Even if 10 percent of them don't

1 actually live in the City limits, there is
2 still more than 20 percent of the votes of a
3 typical at-large Council member received last
4 November, which is a significant percentage.
5 The citizens are trying to talk to the City
6 and the City Council.

7 Most of us at this meeting want to have a
8 bandstand at Bitzer Park, but we disagree on
9 whether to keep most of the current trees as
10 enhancement to that bandstand or remove them
11 because they are an impediment to the success
12 of the bandstand. Really, our difference of
13 opinion is what Bitzer should look like.

14 I really appreciate that Mayor Wilder
15 took the time to meet with me last week. He
16 definitely wants to do what is right for the
17 City. But I think he is misguided and not
18 following the 2012 master plan as to what
19 Bitzer Park should look like.

20 It seems that the City planners want
21 Bitzer Park to be a larger version of the
22 City Hall courtyard. They like the clean
23 lines, the manicured grass, the small trees
24 placed sparingly and symmetrically along
25 wide, concrete walkways. However, while the

1 City Hall courtyard might be interesting to
2 look at it, it is the opposite of what an
3 inviting park should look like.

4 Its few, small trees provide no shade for
5 the benches, so there is no reason for anyone
6 to visit the courtyard. The previous large,
7 beautiful trees in front of and beside City
8 Hall were replaced by a few small trees and
9 much more concrete. However, this change was
10 no -- is nowhere in the 2012 plan. This cost
11 the City a lot of money, only to make what
12 was nice -- a nice, pleasant area into what
13 is now barren and uninviting.

14 When Mayor Wilder and I met at Bitzer
15 Park last week, we sat at a picnic table in
16 the shade of a nearby large tree. That tree,
17 and all the trees near the picnic tables,
18 will be removed according to the current
19 plan. City officials are not following the
20 2012 master plan. That plan knows that
21 pedestrians do not want barren, flat, wide
22 sidewalks. They want shaded sidewalks. Yes,
23 the sidewalks have to be ADA compliant and
24 without trip hazards, but there are
25 inexpensive ways to do that and still have

1 trees.

2 If we really want downtown to be a
3 destination, we have to make it pedestrian
4 friendly, and that requires large trees. So
5 how do we get there regarding Bitzer Park?
6 We have to prioritize the trees. The
7 designers had to decide between having the
8 new fifth lane, having wide sidewalks, and
9 having the current large trees in Bitzer
10 Park. They knew they could only have two of
11 those three, but not all three. They decided
12 that wide -- a wide sidewalk was not as
13 important as having the fifth lane and having
14 the trees. So they put in an ADA compliant,
15 but narrow, tree friendly sidewalk.

16 Trees require maintenance through
17 pruning, and tree-friendly sidewalks require
18 maintenance through repairing bumps caused by
19 roots. It was decided at the time to have a
20 solution that required maintenance, because
21 that was the solution that made downtown more
22 pedestrian friendly. That was the right
23 decision then and it still is. We should not
24 remove trees and replace sidewalks. We just
25 have to maintain both.

1 The 2012 plan shows the amphitheater in
2 Bitzer Park surrounded by large trees. We
3 should try to follow that plan. We should
4 not pay attention to those who use scare
5 tactics about trip hazards on the sidewalks
6 and dying trees.

7 The review that was done a couple weeks
8 ago is a step in the right direction, but it
9 is not enough. The ODNR provides free
10 professional urban forest advice that could
11 help the City assess the benefits and risks
12 of the trees and sidewalks, but the City
13 refuses to contact ODNR, even though the City
14 Council has asked them to. We have time, so
15 let's do this right. Thank you.

16 MR. FONTE: Thanks, Joe.

17 MR. PETERS: Thank you, Joe.

18 MR. YOUNG: Our next was submitted for
19 City Council prior to the deadline per our
20 public notice for the meeting tonight. And I
21 will read it for you now.

22 Denise James, 546 North Main Street,
23 North Canton. I am writing about the trees
24 at Bitzer Park. A park needs trees, and it
25 will need the trees to grow big enough to

1 provide shade. I remember how hot it was at
2 the 720 Market, Main Street festival, the
3 Canton symphony, the farmers' market, because
4 none of those events have -- had, slash, have
5 shade trees.

6 Why can't the bandstand be built and
7 leave the rest alone? It's a lovely -- it's
8 lovely just the way it is. And do we really
9 need to cut all the pines just to make a lane
10 for the bandstand? Why didn't the plans call
11 for as many trees to be saved as possible?

12 As parts and bits of the sidewalk being
13 barely ADA compliant, why wasn't that width a
14 problem when an extra land {sic} was added,
15 causing the sidewalk to be narrow?

16 Extra -- I believe she meant "extra
17 lane."

18 Can't the sidewalk remain brick and just
19 be even? North Canton should be planting and
20 encouraging to plant more trees. We have
21 blighted properties up and down Main Street.
22 Let's focus on those and leave the gem of
23 North Canton alone. Thank you, Denise James.

24 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you for
25 that, Ben.

1 MR. YOUNG: And, lastly, we have Ms. Jodi
2 Farnsworth. Ms. Farnsworth? Make sure she
3 is unmuted. Ms. Farnsworth, are you there?

4 THE WITNESS: I am. I live at 535
5 Pershing Avenue, Southeast.

6 MR. CERRETA: Somebody needs to put their
7 stuff on mute.

8 THE REPORTER: Yes.

9 MR. CERRETA: Let's everyone put their --
10 their phones on mute, please, because -- for
11 respect. Thank you.

12 MR. PETERS: Hey, Ben, can you hold on
13 until I can get everybody on mute here?

14 MR. YOUNG: Yeah.

15 MR. PETERS: Mrs. Farnsworth, I
16 apologize; if you could bear with me for one
17 second.

18 MS. FARNSWORTH: Not a problem. That's
19 fine.

20 MR. PETERS: Okay. All right. Looks
21 like we are good to go. Ben, go ahead and
22 take over.

23 MR. YOUNG: You may continue, Ms.
24 Farnsworth.

25 MS. FARNSWORTH: Okay. Thanks. Thanks

1 so much. I had -- I obviously have no facts
2 or the history of all those -- like the other
3 speakers had regarding Bitzer Park. I have
4 been basically following it on Facebook and
5 through people talking.

6 And as I'm well aware, you -- the whole
7 Council, the Mayor is aware of the
8 community's outcry about this. And I didn't
9 know what your plans were. I just -- my
10 thought was, there is an underlying reason or
11 something pushing for Bitzer Park.

12 Of course, I agree with everyone about
13 the trees. But I also think it involves --
14 it's just a very busy intersection. You have
15 the fire station right there with the sirens
16 and just everyday passing traffic. It
17 doesn't really seem conducive to, you know,
18 hold an event.

19 I do agree with -- I can't remember -- I
20 think it was Mr. Osborne; you know, there are
21 so many other options. Price Park being
22 excellent. You have got the space, as well
23 as the parking.

24 And I just didn't know if this was a yes
25 and a go, if you are going to be listening to

1 the citizens who are saying they do not want
2 whatever agenda it is that the -- that the
3 committee wants or the Council wants to have
4 it in that area. And I was hoping to find
5 out that it will either be -- you know,
6 people will be listened to, there will be a
7 vote on this, rather than the Council just
8 going ahead and doing with their original
9 plan. Thank you.

10 MR. FONTE: Thank you.

11 MR. YOUNG: Ms. Farnsworth was our last
12 recognition of visitor for tonight.

13 MR. PETERS: All right. Ben, thank you
14 very much. Thank you all for the comments.

15 Okay. We will move on to old business.
16 May I have a motion and a second to read by
17 title only Ordinance 34-20?

18 MR. REVOLDT: Revoldt moves.

19 MS. WERREN: Werren seconds.

20 MR. PETERS: All in favor, say "aye."

21 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.

22 MR. PETERS: Aye.

23 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

24 MR. CERRETA: Aye.

25 MR. FONTE: Aye.

1 MS. WERREN: Aye.

2 MR. STROIA: Aye.

3 MR. PETERS: Opposed?

4 (No response.)

5 MR. PETERS: All right. Motion carries.
6 Tim.

7 MR. FOX: An ordinance amending part 11,
8 planning and zoning, of the codified
9 ordinances of the City of North Canton,
10 specifically Chapter 1181, amendments, as
11 described below.

12 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you.
13 Chairman Revoldt.

14 MR. REVOLDT: Thank you, Mr. President.
15 As we discussed in prior sessions, this
16 amendment is administrative through the
17 zoning ordinance. It creates two
18 administrative changes -- or introduces two
19 administrative changes.

20 The first is to improve the process and
21 to improve customer service. It authorizes
22 the Clerk to manage and track the process,
23 and it requires that an applicant meet with
24 our Building Officer prior to submission of
25 a -- of a request to the Planning Commission.

1 We believe that this will save applicants
2 time, energy, and resources if a discussion
3 and identification potential issues can be
4 had before they get to the Planning
5 Commission.

6 I would urge -- if there aren't any other
7 questions, I would urge that we adopt the --
8 or I make a motion that we adopt the third
9 reading of Ordinance 34-2020, if there are no
10 questions.

11 MR. PETERS: All right.

12 MR. FONTE: Daryl -- Daryl, it's Dominic.

13 MR. REVOLDT: Yeah.

14 MR. FONTE: So the concept is to try to
15 meet with the advisor, in essence. Because I
16 know a lot of people get confused by the
17 proper protocol. So they don't waste time
18 and money. So that's really, I think, a
19 smart idea. If it isn't, like, meeting with
20 a consultant in our in-house, you know, they
21 can have a video to watch of the standard
22 procedures of whatever it is they do. So I
23 think it's a good idea.

24 MR. REVOLDT: Thank you.

25 MR. PETERS: Okay. Anyone else?

1 MR. REVOLDT: Is there a second?
2 MR. PETERS: Yeah.
3 MR. FOLTZ: Foltz seconds.
4 MR. PETERS: All in favor, say "aye."
5 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.

1 MR. CERRETA: Aye.

2 MR. FONTE: Aye.

3 MS. WERREN: Aye.

4 MR. STROIA: Aye.

5 MR. PETERS: Opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 MR. PETERS: All right. Motion carries.

8 Tim.

9 MR. FOX: A resolution authorizing the
10 pick-up of employee contributions for the
11 voluntary purchase of military service credit
12 for City of North Canton eligible, full-time
13 employees of the City's police and fire/EMS
14 departments, who are members of the Ohio
15 Police and Fire Pension Fund, through a
16 payroll reduction pickup plan.

17 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you, Tim.
18 This is our third and final reading. Jina
19 has addressed this twice in prior Council
20 meetings. If anyone has any further
21 questions for her, let's take them now. If
22 not, I'll ask for a motion to adopt -- a
23 motion and a second to adopt the third
24 reading.

25 MR. REVOLDT: Revoldt moves.

1 MR. CERRETA: Move.

2 MR. FOLTZ: Foltz seconds.

3 MR. PETERS: All right. Revoldt moves.

4 Foltz seconds. All in favor, say "aye."

5 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.

6 MR. PETERS: Aye.

7 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

8 MR. CERRETA: Aye.

9 MR. FONTE: Aye.

10 MS. WERREN: Aye.

11 MR. STROIA: Aye.

12 MR. PETERS: Opposed?

14 MR. PETERS: All right. Motion carries.

15 Moving on to new business. May I have a

16 motion and a second to read by title only

17 Ordinance 40-20?

18 MR. FOLTZ: Foltz moves.

19 MR. CERRETA: Cerreta moves.

20 MR. FOLTZ: Foltz seconds.

21 MR. PETERS: All right. All in favor,

22 say "aye."

23 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.

24 MR. PETERS: Aye.

25 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

1 MR. CERRETA: Aye.

2 MR. FONTE: Aye.

3 MS. WERREN: Aye.

4 MR. STROIA: Aye.

5 MR. PETERS: Opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 MR. PETERS: All right. Motion carries.
8 Tim.

9 MR. FOX: An ordinance authorizing the
10 Director of Administration to establish
11 rental rates for City owned buildings,
12 facilities, parks, sport events -- I beg your
13 pardon -- sport fields, and portions thereof.

14 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you.
15 Chairman Foltz.

16 MR. FOLTZ: Yeah, I wasn't here last
17 week, so I'm just looking at this, not
18 knowing exactly what was discussed on
19 committee. I'm sure Stephanie or Director
20 DeOrio can weigh in.

21 It just seems to me like we are giving
22 the administration the -- the right to just
23 kind of examine some of our rental and
24 building fees, field fees, and so forth, so
25 they stay on pace with what other communities

1 are doing and what makes sense for us as far
2 as our -- our costs involved with it and so
3 forth.

4 So I'm in favor of this. I would just
5 like to meet with -- as a committee chair,
6 with Member DeOrio before we actually do it,
7 just to kind of review it before it actually
8 comes to Council. But I think he has done a
9 great job now as far as looking at some of
10 our rate structures with Dogwood Shelter,
11 and -- and some of our other amenities.

12 So, Stephanie, if you wanted to weigh in,
13 you are on committee, or Pat, that's fine.
14 I'm just trying to move it forward.

15 MS. WERREN: Yeah. No. We had a good
16 discussion last week. Pat mentioned a lot
17 of -- the different discussions he has had.
18 Pat, if you want to say anything else. But I
19 think we have been talking about it kind
20 of -- I feel like for a couple years, and we
21 are just kind of finally getting it moving
22 and going.

23 MR. FOLTZ: Right.

24 MR. DEORIO: And I think Member Cerreta
25 had brought up last week that -- wanted to

1 make sure that Council was, you know, put on
2 notice officially as to when this would -- if
3 and when this were to ever happen, and it's
4 written into the ordinance that Council must
5 provide at least 14 days' advance notice of
6 any change. So there will be plenty of
7 communication between administration and
8 Council at -- at the time that that would
9 occur in the future.

10 MR. FONTE: Thanks -- thanks, Pat.

11 MR. FOLTZ: Yeah, I appreciate that. So
12 I'm ready to move forward for first reading,
13 unless there are any other comments.

14 MR. FONTE: Nope.

15 MS. WERREN: Second, Werren.

16 MR. PETERS: All right. All in favor,
17 say "aye."

18 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.

19 MR. PETERS: Aye.

20 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

21 MR. CERRETA: Aye.

22 MR. FONTE: Aye.

23 MS. WERREN: Aye.

24 MR. STROIA: Aye.

25 MR. PETERS: Opposed?

1 (No response.)

2 MR. PETERS: All right. Motion carries.
3 Moving on -- and --

4 MR. DEORIO: Mr. President.

5 MR. PETERS: Yes, sir.

6 MR. DEORIO: I just wanted to put it out
7 here before you read this one, that at some
8 point during this, I would -- I would like to
9 ask that an emergency clause be added to this
10 ordinance.

11 MR. PETERS: Yeah, I was just going to
12 ask that question. I thought we discussed
13 that in committee last week.

14 MR. DEORIO: I thought so. But just in
15 case we didn't, I thought I'd bring it up
16 that for purposes of, you know, ensuring
17 good, safe, clean drinking water, I really
18 need to get this into effect as quickly as
19 possible.

20 MR. PETERS: Yeah, I -- I would agree
21 with you. In our discussion last week, I
22 think it was very clear what could -- what
23 the worst possible case scenario could be. I
24 prefer it to have an emergency clause put
25 into this. Does anyone else on Council

1 disagree with that?

2 MR. DEORIO: Probably should let the Law
3 Director weigh in on that.

4 MR. PETERS: I'm sorry. Tim.

5 MR. FOX: Yes, sir, I would agree. This
6 absolutely is -- is an essential, you know,
7 portion of providing potable, safe drinking
8 water to our residents. And this is, you
9 know, a -- a prevention issue from, you know,
10 our -- our main utility that we provide
11 residents. They have to have safe drinking
12 water. And so the backflow prevention device
13 and the -- the system and protocol and
14 inspections that we put in place certainly
15 meets criteria of an emergency legislation.
16 I would recommend it, as well.

17 MR. FONTE: Thank you.

18 MR. FOX: You are welcome.

19 MR. PETERS: Okay. So let's -- should
20 I -- should I just --

21 MR. REVOLDT: You need to read it and
22 then we'll make a motion to amend and insert
23 the emergency clause.

24 MR. CERRETA: There you go.

25 MR. PETERS: Thank you. All right.

1 MR. REVOLDT: I move the first reading of
2 Ordinance 40 -- 41-2020.

3 MR. CERRETA: I'll second it. Cerreta.

4 MR. PETERS: All in favor, say "aye."

5 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.

6 MR. PETERS: Aye.

7 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

8 MR. CERRETA: Aye.

9 MR. FONTE: Aye.

10 MS. WERREN: Aye.

11 MR. STROIA: Aye.

12 MR. PETERS: Opposed?

13 (No response.)

14 MR. PETERS: Motion carries. Thank you.

15 Tim.

16 MR. FOX: An ordinance authorizing the
17 Director of Administration to develop,
18 implement, and maintain administrative
19 policies, guidelines, and fees governing the
20 testing of backflow prevention devices
21 pursuant to the provisions of Section 935.10,
22 backflow prevention device, of the codified
23 ordinances of the City of North Canton.

24 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you.

25 Chairman Cerreta.

1 MR. CERRETA: Okay. We discussed this
2 last week. We just discussed it now. I
3 would move to amend this to add an emergency
4 clause to it.

5 MR. REVOLDT: Revoldt seconds.

6 MR. PETERS: All in favor, say "aye."

7 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.

8 MR. PETERS: Aye.

9 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

10 MR. CERRETA: Aye.

11 MR. FONTE: Aye.

12 MS. WERREN: Aye.

17 May I have a motion and a second to

22 MR. PETERS: Yeah. Thank you. May I
23 have a motion and a second to the adopt the
24 first reading Ordinance 41-2020 as amended to
25 include an emergency clause?

1 MR. REVOLDT: Revoldt moves.
2 MR. FOLTZ: Foltz seconds.
3 MR. PETERS: All in favor, say "aye."
4 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.
5 MR. PETERS: Aye.
6 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.
7 MR. CERRETA: Aye.
8 MR. FONTE: Aye.
9 MS. WERREN: Aye.
10 MR. STROIA: Aye.
11 MR. PETERS: Opposed?
12 (No response.)
13 MR. PETERS: All right. Motion carries.
14 Now may I have a motion and a second to
15 suspend the rules of Council for three
16 readings?
17 MR. REVOLDT: So moved.
18 MR. CERRETA: Motion. Cerreta.
19 MR. REVOLDT: Revoldt seconds.
20 MR. PETERS: All in favor, say "aye."
21 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.
22 MR. PETERS: Aye.
23 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.
24 MR. CERRETA: Aye.
25 MR. FONTE: Aye.

1 MS. WERREN: Aye.
2 MR. STROIA: Aye.
3 MR. PETERS: Opposed?
4 (No response.)
5 MR. PETERS: All right. Motion carries.
6 And, finally, a motion and a second to
7 approve under suspension.
8 MR. REVOLDT: Revoldt moves.
9 MR. CERRETA: Cerreta, second.
10 MR. PETERS: All in favor, say "aye."
11 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.
12 MR. PETERS: Aye.
13 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.
14 MR. CERRETA: Aye.
15 MR. FONTE: Aye.
16 MS. WERREN: Aye.
17 MR. STROIA: Aye.
18 MR. PETERS: Opposed?
19 (No response.)
20 MR. PETERS: All right. Motion carries.
21 Next up, department reports. Deputy
22 Director of Administration.
23 MS. FARINA: I have no report. Thank
24 you.
25 MR. PETERS: Thank you, Catherine.

1 Director of Administration.

2 MR. DEORIO: No report.

3 MR. PETERS: Is that "no report"?

4 MR. DEORIO: I'm sorry. No report.

5 Thank you.

6 MR. PETERS: Thank you, Patrick.

7 Mayor Wilder.

8 MR. WILDER: Yes. Good evening. Thank
9 you. Just a comment; I understand the
10 attention surrounding Bitzer Park. I -- it
11 is -- you know, we have about ten
12 neighborhood parks, but Bitzer Park is a
13 really beautiful, well-located urban park
14 here -- right here in our town center.

15 And the redesigning of Bitzer Park has
16 been discussed for several years. I know
17 illustrations or renderings from the 2012
18 improvement plan may not exactly resemble the
19 plans for these days. Changes happen. I
20 believe the revisions to the park improvement
21 is to make it more usable and enjoyable for
22 the benefit of the general public. Careful
23 consideration will continue to be taken for
24 existing trees, plants, and shrubs, and
25 especially the veterans memorial. That's

1 just a general comment on Bitzer Park.

2 And I just want to continue to caution
3 our public and our residents of the need to
4 follow the guidelines of the recommendations
5 for the Centers of Disease -- Disease Control
6 and prevention and the Ohio Department of
7 Health, our Stark County Health Department,
8 and the officer -- office of the Governor,
9 State of Ohio, please, to -- I strongly
10 recommend and encourage to wear your face
11 coverings in public, practice your social and
12 physical distancing. Six feet is the
13 recommendation. Continue washing your hands
14 with soap and water for 20 seconds, and use
15 hand sanitizer as often as needed, and
16 conducting self-health checks daily to
17 protect yourself and others, and hopefully to
18 stop the spread of the Coronavirus.

19 All I can ask is for us to continue to do
20 that and take care of each other as we -- as
21 we follow those guidelines. So just a couple
22 comments tonight for our public, and thank
23 them for their input. That's all I have, Mr.
24 President. Thank you.

25 MR. PETERS: Thank you, Mayor.

1 Director of Law.

2 MR. FOX: Thank you, sir. Just nothing
3 more, for this summer, as the Mayor said,
4 please follow those guidelines, be safe, and
5 let's have everyone and their families and so
6 forth return energized for the -- for the
7 next term. Thank you.

8 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you.

9 Director of Finance.

10 MS. ALABACK: Thank you. I have just two
11 reminders for our residents and our
12 businesses. July 15th, which is Wednesday of
13 this week, is the extended tax filing
14 deadline, not just for the City of North
15 Canton, for the IRS and for the State of Ohio
16 and for the City of North Canton. So 2019
17 taxes need to be filed and paid by July 15th.
18 That's one reminder.

19 My second reminder, we sent letters out
20 to accounts that have not had payments or
21 have amounts still remaining due on their
22 water bills. July 15th is also the date that
23 we are going to resume penalties. So they
24 will be assessed on your outstanding water
25 bills and shut-offs will resume August 25th.

1 So by the 15th, you -- you can either pay
2 your bill or call our utility department and
3 get set up on a payment plan by Wednesday,
4 July 15th, so you don't have any extra
5 penalties. And that's all I have.

6 MR. FONTE: Thank you.

7 MS. ALABACK: Yes.

8 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you, Jina.
9 Engineer Graham.

10 MR. GRAHAM: Thank you, Mr. President.
11 Just a couple quick things for you this
12 evening. First of all, some really good
13 news, last week on the grant front, our
14 municipal road fund grant the commissioners
15 hand out each year, it's basically our fair
16 share based on the license plate fee
17 collections. Our fair share is somewhere
18 around \$87,000 per year. And last year you
19 recall we got a little over \$202,000 for our
20 Easthill projects.

21 We had similar success this year. They
22 gave us \$180,000 municipal road fund for our
23 East Maple Street project. And of that,
24 we'll split it 50/50 with the commissioners
25 and county engineer for -- for the bridge

1 portion. And also, you know, that's a
2 hundred grand over our fair share. We got
3 another \$40,000 for our Portage Street
4 repaving project. So we got, all in all,
5 \$220,000 to go with the \$202- we got last
6 year, again, when our fair share is closer to
7 \$87-. So we are quite fortunate there.

8 Secondly, just a quick update on our
9 projects. You probably see in our first wave
10 of projects this spring and early summer is
11 kind of coming to an end with a few wrapping
12 up in the next couple weeks. And I kind of
13 want to mention three projects coming --
14 we'll call it our second wave.

15 I've got a pre-construction meeting
16 Thursday morning with our contractor for the
17 Easthill project. Superior Paving is looking
18 to get started on that around the end of
19 July, beginning of August. Thursday
20 afternoon, I have another pre-construction
21 meeting with the East Maple contractor.
22 That's Central Allied Enterprises. They are
23 looking also to get started on East Maple
24 around the end of the month or early August.
25 So those two will be kicking off while we are

1 on break.

2 And then the third and final large
3 capital project we had in the budget was the
4 Pittsburgh waterline. That's where we had
5 the CDBG funding. The commissioners have set
6 the bid date. They'll open bids. Since
7 there is CDBG funding in the project, they'll
8 handle the bidding and the construction
9 contract. And they are going to open bids on
10 Tuesday, August 18th. So the hope is we can
11 still get that in in the fall.

12 And unless there are any other questions,
13 that completes my report, Mr. President.

14 MR. PETERS: All right.

15 MR. FONTE: Thanks, Rob.

16 MR. PETERS: Thank you, Rob.

17 Council Clerk Young.

18 MR. YOUNG: My only report is that Jen
19 Boger, our local representative to -- or from
20 the Ohio Ethics Commission, had asked me to
21 one last time remind all elected officials
22 and everyone who ran for office in 2019 that
23 the extended filing date for financial
24 exposure forms is Wednesday, July 15th.

25 MR. PETERS: Hey, Ben, can you also touch

1 on what you and I discussed today regarding
2 the interview next Tuesday?

3 MR. YOUNG: Yes. So today, the office of
4 Council conducted preliminary interviews for
5 our fall interns. And next Tuesday, Council
6 President Peters and Council Vice-President
7 Revoldt will be interviewing the top two
8 candidates to be selecting our intern for the
9 fall.

10 Our current intern at Walsh has elected
11 to apply for the internship with the City of
12 North Canton law department, instead of
13 staying with Council; so --

14 MR. PETERS: Best of luck to him.

15 MR. YOUNG: He will be with us through
16 August 17th, and then that next week, the new
17 intern will begin.

18 MR. PETERS: All right. Outstanding.
19 Thank you, Ben.

20 Okay. Next up, Council reports. Member
21 Foltz.

22 MR. FOLTZ: Thank you. Just to weigh in
23 on Bitzer Park, I appreciate the Mayor's
24 comments. I appreciate the public having
25 their point of view and discussing that and

1 signing petitions. That's the way government
2 should work. We have been listening.

3 I think just to retract a little bit, as
4 far as what's heard here lately, I think -- I
5 think it was June 29th -- you know, recently
6 it's been a blur as far as our meetings. But
7 I believe we had a committee meeting, and I
8 had an opportunity to meet with our Director
9 DeOrio and then Cathy Farina there. And we
10 discussed the trees.

11 And I think we found a pretty good
12 compromise here of some of the existing trees
13 that were already there that we were going to
14 save. I believe nine of them; four oaks, a
15 tulip, a buckeye, two locusts, and at least
16 one maple. Maybe another maple if -- if the
17 construction goes right.

18 So I believe doing that gives us the
19 opportunity to keep the existing trees that
20 we can save, and then plant other trees
21 around it. So -- so the discussion points
22 were we'll have another tree growth come in
23 as a phase two when these mature trees
24 actually reach their life span.

25 So I think that's the win. We are

1 combining existing shade trees, hardwoods,
2 with new shade trees coming in with the new
3 project. The pines and some of the crabs,
4 the ornamental crabs, the ornamental trees,
5 even though they are in the park, they are
6 really not good shade trees. The pines, if
7 you are going to put a structure in, you are
8 going to have to lose some of the trees or --
9 or cut down some of them.

10 The pines themselves are pretty well, I
11 say, distressed. Other words are, you know,
12 they are reaching their life expectancy right
13 now, and there is not a lot of room for them
14 to continue in their shape or form to be
15 productive for the public.

16 So I think it's a win where we are at
17 with -- with ten. I applaud the citizens for
18 getting involved. And I think when we are
19 all said and done, I think it's going to be a
20 great project that we -- we can all be proud
21 of. Thank you.

22 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you, Doug.
23 And I would simply say and echo Doug's
24 comments. I agree with everything he said.
25 I think we found a good compromise. I'm

1 excited to see the finished product. Change
2 is never easy. But I think once this project
3 is complete and the folks have seen the final
4 product, I think you are going to be very
5 proud of what is in the square.

6 So moving on, Member Werren.

7 MS. WERREN: Thanks. Doug, you summed it
8 up perfectly. And I just appreciate both
9 sides, and, you know, the comments and the
10 reflection and the thoughtfulness. But this
11 is just phase one of what we are doing with
12 the park, and all -- so much is grant money.
13 And we just have a lot of possibilities for
14 what we can kind of create for a town center.
15 So I'm excited. And thanks for everyone's
16 hard work. Thanks.

17 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you,
18 Steph.

19 Member Fonte.

20 MR. FONTE: Yes. Thanks, everybody.
21 Thanks for the input from our guests. A lot
22 of great points there, which, again, gave us
23 pause to make sure that we did our due
24 diligence to make sure. And Doug summed it
25 up pretty well. I agree with that.

1 I just wanted to point out, you know,
2 with the COVID and all the distractions and
3 everything, just, you know, it's important to
4 remember the devil strips in front of your
5 properties, to kind of maintain those. I
6 mean, I was driving down Everhard Road again
7 today, and, you know, it's looking sloppy.

8 There are a couple properties that look
9 like they are in the City of North Canton,
10 but they have never been annexed in; closer
11 to the train tracks on the north side of the
12 street. There are some areas that you can't
13 even walk through. So I have been in contact
14 with the -- the Plain Township people, and
15 they are trying to get their street
16 department over there to clean it all up.

17 And there are some other areas that we
18 noticed that we are trying to get cleaned up.
19 But maybe if we get a chance, maybe we stick
20 it in the water bill to remind people. The
21 devil strip -- you know, please take care of
22 your devil strip. Make it look nice and
23 neat, so we have a nice, tidy, little
24 community. Lead by example. Right?

25 And the other thing is, there are a lot

1 of small businesses that are struggling to
2 stay in business, and we want to always
3 support our local businesses, especially when
4 they are in the City, paying taxes. Right?

5 The other thing I was going to mention
6 is -- is that, Rob, you know, you are really
7 kicking it up on the street department. I
8 keep hoping there is going to be a little
9 excess money there to fix one little section
10 that I keep talking about. But maybe we'll
11 get all our utilities and all that next year.
12 But if nothing else, maybe we patch that
13 section of Glenwood where it needs it.

14 And then the final thing is everybody
15 have a great summer. And if you had a magic
16 wand, what would you do with it? Jina?
17 That's all.

18 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you, Dom.
19 Member Cerreta.

20 MR. CERRETA: Yes. First of all, Rob,
21 your road projects, okay, you know,
22 Applegrove, the Sanctuary neighborhood -- I
23 know Portage is coming along. You have done
24 a great job. I know -- you know, beforehand,
25 you were listening on Facebook or if you saw

1 people complaining, what are they doing,
2 what's going on with Applegrove. But, you
3 know, it looks terrific. And I don't hear
4 anybody on there saying, or see, hey, that
5 looks terrific.

6 So I'm telling you, it looks great. You
7 did a wonderful job on Applegrove. It's a
8 main throughway through our City, in and out.
9 So wonderful job there. And thanks for the
10 grants that you are having there for us
11 moving forward.

12 With respect to the Bitzer Park and the
13 trees -- and I know a lot of comments were
14 made here. And, you know, I do also want to
15 commend those folks who have the passion and
16 commitment to exercise. You know, we all do
17 respect that.

18 I grew up here, and I have always said
19 this Council is not the people. We represent
20 the people. And so it is good to listen to
21 different opinions and so on. I always
22 said -- I always like to refer to it as a
23 coach. Someone, though, does have to call
24 the plays when it's all over. You can't just
25 listen to the crowd the whole time, when you

1 are moving forward and trying to -- to be
2 successful, in this case, for our community's
3 success.

4 So when I look at Bitzer Park, I see a
5 park that's used by the community maybe two
6 or three times a year. And some folks walk
7 through there and they see a memorial, which
8 it's not a cemetery. It is a memorial. And
9 the more people that see that thing, the more
10 people will recognize, you know, what those
11 folks did for our -- our world today. And
12 rather than just putting it somewhere that --
13 it's great for a lot of people to come in and
14 see that.

15 But many of us, like including myself, I
16 like to look at Bitzer Park as -- as kind of
17 our little Central Park in New York. You
18 know, and -- but that park has events and
19 stuff that do attract people. And I think we
20 need to do that.

21 I -- I am very hopeful that when we see
22 this new park, the renditions that the State
23 money is going to pay for to add this
24 wonderful community thing, you know, so I --
25 I think that -- I can't wait to see it.

1 And now when you start looking at the
2 question of the trees, and the scenario of
3 that tree reminds me of what we did on East
4 Maple Street about five, six years ago. We
5 had all those large, old dirty oak trees that
6 lined East Maple Street next to the Hoover
7 building, and we took those down. And some
8 people were outraged. Some of the same
9 people that are here talking about this
10 subject.

11 And we took those old, dirty trees down
12 and replaced them with wonderful, pretty
13 trees that bloom in the spring. They don't
14 tear up the sidewalk. We widened the
15 sidewalk. We made it safer to walk. We gave
16 it a cleaner look. It's a beautiful, you
17 know, addition to the City, with the brick
18 pillars and fence and so on. So I expect us
19 to do the same thing and get the same
20 feedback that we have gotten on that to the
21 park in itself.

22 So, you know, for the folks that, you
23 know, are looking at the trees, I think you
24 are still looking at the -- the architect's
25 rendition. I think Doug mentioned that he

1 added some trees. And I -- that could even
2 change even more, because I want shade when I
3 go to events down there.

4 So I think that the -- the project is
5 the -- is really the best thing for our
6 community now and in the future. I think it
7 needs to be maintained going forward with it.
8 Again, as much shade as possible. And I
9 guess I want to look at it -- and I think we
10 should all look at it, if this was our own
11 house, and you had some big, old trees with
12 them pending on your sidewalk or driveway or
13 patio, and you had grant money to build a
14 wonderful surrounding area that your family
15 could use for many years to come, with the
16 choice of additional new trees for the
17 future, what would you do?

18 I think it's a pretty simple thing. And
19 if I was calling the plays, I would call the
20 same play that we are doing right now. But I
21 do -- I do think we need to look at how much
22 more shade we can put in there. So that's
23 all from Cerreta. Everybody have a good --

24 MR. FONTE: Hey, Mark --

25 MR. CERRETA: -- time off there, and be

1 safe. Yep.

2 MR. FONTE: Mark, couldn't they plant
3 even just a little bit -- instead of the baby
4 trees, a few little bit larger trees? Since
5 we are older --

6 MR. CERRETA: Yep.

7 MR. FONTE: -- maybe we don't have to
8 wait as long for them grow to privacy. You
9 know, that's just a thought.

10 MR. CERRETA: As big of trees as
11 possible.

12 MR. FONTE: Okay.

13 MR. CERRETA: Yep.

14 MR. FONTE: Got it.

15 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you, Mark.
16 Excellent comments.

17 Next up, Member Stroia.

18 MR. STROIA: Hey, everybody. Thank you,
19 Chuck, Joseph, Jodi, and Denise. I
20 appreciate your enthusiasm. I agree and echo
21 the same sentiments that Mark and Doug had
22 said. Thank you, Mayor, for your addresses.
23 I know everybody greatly still appreciates
24 that.

25 And buy and support local. And I'm

1 looking at the paving project on Portage
2 right now, and it's coming along very nicely.
3 So I appreciate that, as well. Thank you,
4 everybody, and have a good break.

5 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you, Matt.
6 Okay. At this time, final call for new
7 business --

8 MR. CERRETA: How about Daryl? Did we
9 hear from Daryl?

10 MR. PETERS: Daryl. I'm sorry. Daryl.

11 MR. REVOLDT: Thank you.

12 MR. PETERS: I passed over you. I
13 apologize.

14 MR. FOLTZ: Wait. Do we have a motion
15 for Daryl to address Council? I don't know
16 if we're going to pass this right now.

17 MR. REVOLDT: You better set up a
18 five-minute limit on my --

19 MR. PETERS: Oh, my goodness.

20 MR. FOLTZ: This is going to be
21 a filibuster, isn't it?

22 MR. PETERS: Oh, my goodness.

23 MR. CERRETA: We are never going to end
24 this meeting now.

25 MR. PETERS: Here we go.

1 MR. REVOLDT: Well, before we go off to
2 break, I'd like to make a couple observations
3 about the comments made tonight. And as I do
4 from time to time, given my particular
5 vintage, I go back -- I go back in time to
6 previous Memorial Day parades. Probably many
7 of you don't realize that the City, back in
8 the '80s, experimented with a number of
9 routes for its parade. And, eventually, that
10 Memorial Day parade came down Main Street and
11 ended at Bitzer. And the idea was to draw
12 the people who watch the parade to a brief
13 program to reflect on the meaning of Memorial
14 Day. We wanted a crowd to gather at the
15 City's historic square.

16 You know, this was the place where our
17 veterans marched off to the Civil War. It's
18 where we burned the Kaiser. And as we got
19 well into that -- well into the 20th century,
20 it became the gathering place for a number of
21 historic events; the tree -- the Hoover tree
22 lighting, and then subsequently our own tree
23 lighting, the 4th of July run, which is, you
24 know, almost 50-plus years old. The square
25 is our community gathering place.

1 Now, it has been characterized that
2 somehow this is not respected by using the
3 square for that purpose. And I would argue
4 that one of the reasons that that veterans
5 memorial was created was so people would see
6 it, as I think Mark referenced. We didn't
7 want to tuck it away in some location where
8 only a handful of people would ever stop and
9 reflect.

10 And, in fact, I would also point out that
11 the plaques on the back of that memorial came
12 from the Hoover Company, where it hung in a
13 small alcove, where people clocking in every
14 day walked past it. And that act of going to
15 work was no disrespect -- that is no
16 disrespect to the honor of the people who are
17 starred on that plaque.

18 So I'm really comfortable with having
19 that memorial in that park where, on at least
20 three or four occasions, it can be surrounded
21 by townsmen. And more importantly, we have
22 had over the years what I consider First
23 Amendment activities on that square. What
24 better way to remind ourselves of our
25 commitment to that First Amendment than those

1 who have given their lives in its protection
2 and defense.

3 Now, I would say that -- and first of
4 all, as -- I applaud those who have spoken
5 this evening. I think we all want to be
6 responsive public commitment. But it's a
7 two-way street. We have open records, open
8 meetings. I do not believe public discourse
9 is -- is served by petitions that may not be
10 complete. And I have looked at it, a
11 petition that has a name and an e-mail
12 address, but no residential address.

13 Think about that a second. Every one of
14 us -- every one of us, when we sign a
15 petition, puts our address on it. And I
16 think we live in this age where we tend to
17 use a little bit of hyperbole when we
18 describe -- we describe situations. But to
19 say that our concern for pedestrian safety is
20 a scare tactic I think does us a disservice
21 as we -- as we legitimately work through
22 issues.

23 And my expectation is that -- and I speak
24 only for myself -- that I expect -- I expect
25 when a person comes to the mike -- and I have

1 said this to Chuck repeatedly -- we stick to
2 the facts and we address the facts and don't
3 dismiss them. It has to do with respecting
4 the opinions of all.

5 And that, Mr. Peters, is the way I'm
6 going to close up before summer break.

7 MR. PETERS: Thank you, Daryl. That was
8 well worth the wait.

9 MR. FOLTZ: Amen.

10 MR. PETERS: All right. At this -- at
11 this time, I will now have final call for new
12 business to Council.

13 (No response.)

16 will return August 17th, Committee of the
17 Whole. And that concludes our agenda. I'll
18 entertain a motion to adjourn.

20 MR. FOLTZ: Foltz seconds.

21 MR. PETERS: All in favor, say "aye."

22 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.

23 MR. PETERS: Aye.

24 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

25 MR. CERRETA: Aye.

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MR. FONTE: Aye.

MS. WERREN: Aye.

MS. STROIA: Aye.

MR. PETERS: Opposed?

(No response.)

MR. PETERS: Motion carries. We are
